Will Make Money.

A feature of the Treasury department exhibit in the Government building at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be a mint in full operation, where souvenir medals will be turned out every day instead of gold and silver coins.

The mint will show visitors the various steps required in the production of coins except the assaying and refining. The plant will consist of a full set of minting machinery manufactured at the Philadelphia mint and designed ultimately for use at the new Denver mint. The medals turned out will be of an artistic design, and the visitor may see every step of manufacture from the time the piece of metal is placed in the machine until it is thrown out on the table and wrapped in tissue paper for him to carry home as a souvenir.

Alongside of the mint exhibit will be the display of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, which not only prints all the paper currency of the country, but prints its postage and revenue stamps as well. This too will be an active exhibit, for a printing press will be continuously operated, illustrating the method by which the Government has its finest printing work done at Washington. Specimen plates of a special design will be printed in view of the visitors. This bureau will also show specimens of the bonds, notes, certificates and other obligations issued by the United States, full sets of postage and revenue stamps, including stamps prepared for the Philippines, and specimens of notes, bonds, etc., showing all the processes from blank paper to a finished note.

TO GET THE "SACK."

Its Equivalent in Olden Times Was to Get the "Canvas."

Canvas, called by Chaucer canevass, is a closely woven heavy cloth of hemp or flax, used for any purpose for which strength and durability are required, such as sailcloth or fabrics used for oil paintings, tapestry or embroidery. Its name is derived from the Latin cannabiss, hemp, the material from which it is manufactured.

"To give one the canvas," or "to receive the canvas," was the old phrase equivalent to the modern "to give one the sack," or "to get the sack," in allusion to the canvas tool bags carried by mechanics of the day.

In such a phrase as "to canvass the neighborhood," the word canvass, in which the "s" is doubled, comes from the French canabasser, to sift as through canvas, and literally means to sift the neighborhood, to solicit votes or interest, by separating supporters from opponents.

Our Misnamed Quail.

America's typical game bird, the quail, is not named correctly at all, according to the government ornithologist. He says that the real quail is the quail of the Bible and that this is a bird belonging exclusively to the old world. The true quail does not occur in America at all. In many parts of this country the American bird is known as partridge, but the American partridge is really the ruffed grouse, and the true partridge again is another old world bird and not American. He thinks that the name given to it in many localities, "bobwhite," is as good as any. The name comes from the cry of the bird, which is something like "bobwhite, bobwhite, bobwhite."

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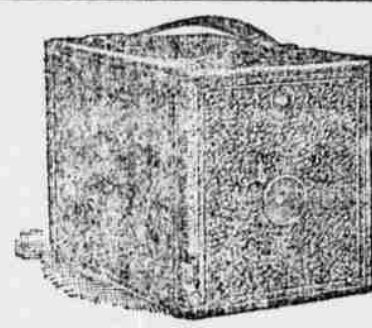
