Wisconsin has a law prohibiting the sale or manufacture of cigarettes or cigarette papers in the state. The great reform is moving westward and is due in Oregon in about fifty years.

Oklahoma comes to the front with the first cyclone of the season, but it wasn't a very big one, killing but one person and injuring a score. We shall soon hear from Kansas, Missouri and Iowa.

The Russian council of war has exonerated General Stoessel for surrendering Port Arthur. After careful investigation the council holds the Japs responsible for the disaster. This is a surprising bit of news.

The fact that burglars are unusually active in Portland is not, perhaps, due to the inefficiency of the police department. It simply proves that Portland citizens are sound sleepers and worth robbing. Burglars have no time for a deal town.

The largest lumber manufacturing plant in the world is to be built and operated at St. Johns, a suburb of Portland. We sincerely hope "Interior" Hitchcock will not interfere with the promoters of this enterprise. Oregon needs a little prestige in that line just about now.

Missouri at last has a Republican United States Senator, after one of the most bitter deadlocks on record. His name is Warner, and, if as nearly right as reported, will probably serve a full term. Only an exceptionally able and popular Republican will last long in the state made famous by its mules.

The Russian soldier receives less than two cents per day for fighting for his country, not figuring in board and clothes. The Oregonian says ex-Governor Geer is being boomed to succeed both United States Senator Mitchell and Congressman Hermann. This is hardly square. Besides, a large number of thoughtful Republicans believe Mr. Geer would shine brighter and be worth more to his party and state as a high private in the rear rank.

Mayor Tom L. Johnson of Cleveland, O., who is a "get there" enthusiast, predicts that a rapid transit device of the future will be something similar to a toboggan slide, which will carry passengers from New York to Chicago in two hours. The present schedule between the cities is 29 hours. Tom L. is a pretty good fellow, but somewhat afflicted with visions. Ten times faster than the schedule of the leading railroads would certainly be going some.

The late Oregon Legislature passed appropriation bills aggregating \$2,259,335.51. While this is less by \$254,000 than the appropriation by the Legislature of 1903, when the Lewis and Clark Fair bill was a big item, it is more by \$388,000 than was ever before appropriated for ordinary purposes. The question now arises: What county, city or town, or state institution, which is in any manner benefited by this appropriation is willing to have its share returned to the state treasury? Don't all speak at once!

Seattle has got its head away up in the air, and all because of a brand-new baby girl citizen weighing 17 3/4 pounds. Portland weakly tries to knock out the record by claiming the birth of a baby 15 years ago which weighed 18 pounds, but didn't live to enjoy the honor. The only square way is to hand Seattle the ribbon and look pleasant. Such displays of jealousy are unseemly. Portland is still the home of the Lewis and Clark Fair and has Seattle distanced when it comes to famous municipal officials and footpads.
