The Expected Happened.

The long-expected naval battle between the Russian and Japanese fleets occurred Saturday, Sunday and Monday in the Straits of Korea, resulting in an overwhelming victory for the Japs. Twenty-two Russian fighting ships of all classes were destroyed, the Japs coming out of the terrible conflict with the loss of three torpedo boats. The casualties are unknown, but on the Russian side the dead and wounded list must be heavy. More than 3000 Russians were taken prisoner, among them being Admiral Rojestvensky, who is badly wounded. It is the same old story—the Russians were outgeneraled and outfought—and the report again comes from the Russian capital that Russia will fight it out on this line if it takes all summer.

Colonel Hofer of the Salem Journal may be indicted one of these days, but of course he's not guilty. He's all right.

The first man in Oregon to come in contact with the whipping post law made and provided for wife beaters is a member of the famous McGinty family and his home is in Portland. Oregon's metropolis is bound to lead in everything this year.

The Lewis and Clark Fair opened in Portland yesterday. Vice President Fairbanks, "Uncle Joe" Cannon and other big guns were present and there is no doubt that the big show was opened to the limit. Easterners are cordially invited to come out and take a look at it.

Of special interest to farmers is an article in the June Cosmopolitan, "Butter, Cheese and Condensed Milk as Factory Products." It is written by Mr. Clarence B. Lane, of the Department of Agriculture, who is one of the foremost authorities in the country on these subjects. Mr. Lane has written a most interesting account of the transfer of these industries from the farm to the factory, showing what the farmer has gained thereby and describing the wonderful and intricate apparatus used in preparation of dairy products on a large scale. The article is extensively illustrated.

Nebraska at the Fair.

The state of Nebraska will exploit its resources at the Lewis and Clark Exposition by moving pictures. While sheaves of Nebraska grain and other produce will be shown extensively, the state will make a feature of demonstrations by pictures thrown upon a screen on the principle that "the machine can't lie." The pictures shown, which will be of the moving or living variety, will enable visitors to gain a clear idea as to how farming is carried on in Nebraska. A theater has been built in the Agriculture building, and the moving picture shows will be free to all.

Nebraska will feature her corn display at the Fair, for the state is a leading corn producer, growing between 60 and 70 varieties of the cereal—more varieties than any other state. Two carloads of corn and sheaf grain have been installed in the Nebraska section of the Agriculture building.

Nebraska day at the Western World's Fair has not been decided upon definitely, but probably it will be August 20, the anniversary of the death of Sergeant John Floyd. Sergeant Floyd, the only member of the Lewis and Clark expedition who died during the more than two year's journey to the Pacific, passed away at Dakota City, Neb., and was buried on the opposite side of the river, near Sioux City.
