A number of competative drills also will be held.

The battle proper will be between two detachments, one wearing the brown kahki uniform and the other the blue. The browns will entrench themselves on the hillside directly west of the Exposition grounds and await the approach of the attacking party of blues. The field artillery will supplement the entrenched force, while the cavalry will assist the attacking party, oserating from the rear or flank.
