That Toledo Bluejacket.

CAVITE, P. L., June 11, 1905.
Dear Folks One and All:
Your very welcome letter of May 7, also the papers, were received by me today. I will try to answer as well as I can, although there is no news, I sent you the papers about the Russians. They are still here and have dismantled until the war is over. They had to dismantle, as there was a strong Jap fleet off here waiting for them to come out. I guess the war is just about over now. We had expected to see Japan again on the way home, but the Solace will go direct to San Francisco via Guam, Wake and Midway Island; also Honolulu. I will try to see Zene Copeland while we are in Honolulu. The Solace and Lawton have orders to sail for 'Frisco as soon as they possibly can, so we leave here about the 20th or 21st of this month—June—some fifteen days sooner than we expected. I tell you we boys are not sorry to see the last of this God-forgotten hole. I presume we will spend the 4th of July at sea, as it takes some 18 days from Guam to Honolulu, and five days from here to Guam; then seven days from Honolulu to San Francisco. You see we have a run of 4000 miles to make. I expect to take four days' furlough as soon as we get in 'Frisco. I shall visit Uncle George and Joe for one day. We should arrive in San Francisco between the 20th and 25th of July. I must now close, as I hope to see you all three months from now.
By the time you get this letter I hope to be in Honolulu, on my way to God's own country, and I do not intend to ship over if I can make it on the outside. I am not finding any fault with Uncle Sam. He has treated me fine and is a good fellow to work for; but life is too short, as you say, and I will try to be near you from this on. I must now say good-bye. This will be my last letter from here.
