We have President Roosevelt's word for it that the preliminary work on the Panama canal is progressing rapidly and that the canal will certainly be completed on schedule time and at a cost possibly below the estimate. There seems to be nothing to do now but keep quiet about it and watch the canal grow—that is, after the agreement as to plans has been reached by Congress—an important item, by the way.

"Sockless" Jerry Simpson died at his home in Wichita, Kan., Monday morning, after a lingering illness. He was famous as a populist when that party held sway for five or six years in the Middle West, and, regardless of his somewhat eccentric nature and large fund of now repudiated ideas, he was a good man at heart. As a dispatch from Wichita to the daily press says: "He never forgot a friend, and never failed to forgive an enemy." These traits in any man will cover a multitude of shortcomings.

It is possible to elect a Republican successor to Governor Chamberlain who will be in every way acceptable to the people of Oregon—a man who has the ability to perform with credit the duties of the high office, who has not been identified with factional quarrels, and who is even guilty of being sober every day in the year. Unless a Republican with these qualifications is nominated, a large number of Republicans may see no good reason for voting against Governor Chamberlain. This is not a dream, but widespread sentiment.

J. B. Ziegler, a former citizen of Lincoln county, now of Portland, is given space in Monday's Oregonian for one of his characteristic pen efforts. He states that while a resident of this county he was unjustly taxed and discriminated against by the Commissioners' Court in the matter of funds for road making. Mr. Ziegler is well remembered by many citizens of Lincoln county, more especially by the county officials of the period in which he resided here and the newspaper men. He was—and is yet, apparently—a ready writer and talker, and spent more time in talking and trying to break into print than he did in hewing a home out of the wilderness. He has no kick coming against Lincoln county. When he disposed of his interests here he took away more than he earned.

Poles and Russians.

Hugo Ganz in his book on Russia writes as follows of the relations existing between the Russian officials and the Poles: "They remain separate, like oil and water. The Russian, even though he is the master, is of no consequence here. It is only necessary to observe for the space of an hour from some corner of the elegant dining room of the hotel the behavior of the Polish society and the complete isolation of the Russian officers or officials. It is only necessary to be able to distinguish the groups from one another—the Polish nobility with their almost bourgeois families, merchants from all the principal countries, Russian functionaries and Polish society—and it will at once become clear who is at home here, firmly rooted to the soil, so that all others become strangers and intruders. It is the Poles, and the Poles alone."

The Bismillah Ceremony.

A little Moslem when she is four years four months old goes through the "name of God," or Bismillah, ceremony, which begins her real life. She is dressed in cloth of gold, with a veil and wreath of flowers, and friends are invited to salute the little queen. She sits on a gold cushion, which must be borrowed if she hasn't one, and all the rest sit on the floor. Then an old mollah recites very slowly a certain verse from the Koran, which is also written in saffron on a silver plate Bibi holds in her hand. She runs her fingers over the words and stammers them after him. "Say it now, Bibi. Be a good girl, then you shall see your presents." Soon they all cry: "Shabash! Shabash! Wah! Wah!" and the ceremony of the little girl's first lesson in reading, writing and religion is over. She salams mamma, then shows her presents to her sahelis (girl friends).—Edmund Russell in Everybody's.

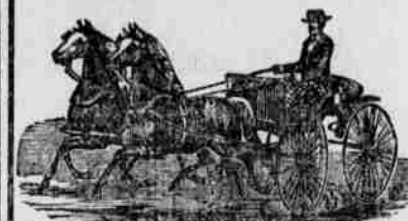
