COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Doings of the City Dads in Regular Session.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or.,
Jan. 4, 1906.

The common council of the city of Toledo met in regular session. Present—Mayor Vincent, Councilmen Arnold, Anderson, Gardner, McCaulon, Fish and Van Cleve, and Recorder Krogstad.

The full Council being present, the following business was transacted:

Minutes of last regular sessions of December 18, 1905, and January 1, 1906, read, and upon motion approved.

The following claims were audited:

On motion above bills allowed in full, except the one of Toledo Water and Electric Light Company, which was allowed in the sum of \$60, on account of one hydrant not being in servicable condition.

Reports of City Treasurer and Recorder referred to committee on ways and means.

On motion Recorder was instructed to ascertain at what rate of insurance our City Hall and contents may be insured.

On motion Recorder was instructed to procure a tank for storing gasoline.

On motion the Marshal's salary was fixed at \$35 per month for January, February, March and April, 1906, and that his duties, besides that of Marshal, be to do all repairing of crosswalks and sidewalks, lighting of street lamps, cleaning mud from crossings, and to

look after the interests of the City property in general.

On motion Ordinance Committee ordered to draw up ordinance embodying above motion and present same at next session of the council.

On motion the Council accepted the three firemen's ladders of Thomas H. Horning, now in City's possession, allowing him \$10 for same, for which sum warrant be drawn.

On motion Marshal ordered to place a lamp on post in front of bell tower at City Hall.

On motion Council adjourned.
