The great state of Washington, jealous as ever of peerless Oregon, now points with pride to a very active colony of "Holy Rollers."

State Printer Whitney has been a competent official and is in every way deserving of a second term. At this date it looks like an easy thing for "Joe" in the primaries and, of course, a walkover in June.

During the recent rainy period down in sunny California the maximum precipitation per day was 8 1/2 inches, with a daily average of about one-half that amount. And yet some silly Californians have the nerve to speak of Oregon as the "Webfoot" state.

The Willamette Valley Development League has decided to hold no more conventions this year until after the June election. This means that the ardor of several warm developers will have cooled to the freezing point when the League again gets ready to develop something.

A department writer on the Oregonian who averages humorous finds it necessary to preface every sensible or serious paragraph with the words: "This is not a joke." He is in almost as bad a fix as some of the self-constituted saviors of the country who take themselves seriously every day in the week.

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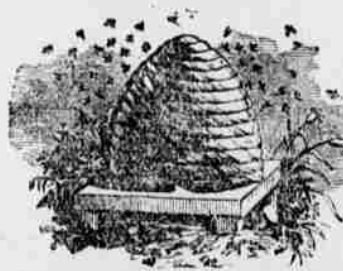
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
