Senator Fulton of Oregon presided over the United States Senate Tuesday afternoon while Vice President Fairbanks took a much needed rest or something. While Mr. Fulton filled the more or less honored chair gracefully and creditably, we believe it was a put-up job to keep him from talking and working for appropriations for Oregon rivers and harbors. Senator Fulton is a busy and able representative, and is rapidly winning the good-will of all with whom he has official relation.

THE LEADER has thoroughly investigated the matter and learns that the small chunk of winter which struck Lincoln county the fore part of the week sprouted in Nebraska and was borne hither by the brutal East wind. The blizzard-breeding part of the world sends us a chilly greeting about once in every seven years, but we never get mad about it. Those states which are so thoroughly saturated with disagreeable weather that they must sleep over occasionally have our profound sympathy.

Western sentiment on the land question, so far as a new policy affects existing public domain, is growing rapidly. With defeat of the effort to repeal the timber and stone act, through the vote of the House committee on public lands, the West scored its first victory, and thereafter found the struggle easier. There is not much prospect at the present time of the Senate committee on public lands reporting a measure for repeal of the act and making no provision for taking timber land, as it intended three weeks earlier, and even should the committee report such a bill, it appears probable that it could be defeated in the Senate, without regard to the adverse action of the House committee. Senator Fulton is not relaxing the fight he waged, and which was the keynote for the Western movement. He is still gathering data from every county of this state, showing conditions of the public domain, and furnishing many arguments why it is essential to Western development that the states be permitted to realize in some substantial manner on their native resources. Should the Senate committee report favorably, which is improbable, the defense of the Western contingent in the Senate would be spirited and determined. These preparations are being made by most of the Senators, while conceding that there has been grave abuse of the timber and stone act. The general sentiment in this respect seems to have been expressed by Senator Fulton when he said that he would be glad to amend this evil, but could not risk complete withdrawal of all public domain timbered land.

One of the states to use convict labor in road construction for a long time is North Carolina, and this commonwealth is credited with having about the best system of highways to be found in any state of the Union similarly situated with regard to population and industries. North Carolina has set an example that is being closely studied by many other Eastern and Southern states. It has been so successful in getting good work and at a very low cost, that the demonstration is regarded the best yet made in the country of the handling of convicts. The open air work is said to be beneficial to the health of the prisoners, and is taken up more eagerly than the drudgery of some callings which involve all inside employment. It is also stated on good authority that North Carolina is comparatively humane in treatment of prisoners, as none of the abuses apprehended in work distant from the penitentiary have been recorded.

Speaking of C. A. Johns, candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor, the Corvallis Times says: "Mr. Johns' boyhood was spent on the banks of Thomas creek, in the Forks of the Santiam, Linn county, where he was for years the playmate of the editor of this paper. From Seio Mr. Johns went to Salem, where in 1887 he was graduated with honors from Willamette University. He studied law and practiced for several years with success in Dallas, where he served as county judge of Polk county. Baker City began to boom then, and about 18 years ago he went to the town and located there for the practice of his profession. He has been widely successful in his profession and has become a leading man of affairs. It is generally believed that the race for the nomination is between Judge Johns and Dr. Withycombe, both of whom are excellent men."

Susan B. Anthony, the noted equal suffrage leader, died soon after midnight Monday morning, at the age of 86. Miss Anthony was a great and good woman and retained her wonderful faculties until within a few hours of her death. She will be sadly missed by her devoted co-workers in the cause of which she was for fifty years the most able champion, but it is safe to say her death will serve only as an inspiration to greater effort. The good work which she left in other hands will not be neglected.
