Jonathan Bourne.

Jonathan Bourne is advertising for votes in Benton county. He wants to be United States Senator. It will be a very slim support that he will corral among Benton Republicans. Their recollection of Mr. Bourne is that he was the chief conspirator in concocting a very expensive hold-up legislature, seven or eight years ago. Because he could not get a majority of the representatives to support him for speaker of the lower house, he formed a combination to prevent organization of that body. Allied with influences hostile to Mitchell, who was then a candidate for senator, he prevented the organization of the house, and through forty long days there was the humiliating spectacle at Salem of a senate in session at legislative horse-play, with members of the lower house in hopeless and disgraceful disorganization. It was the most disgraceful episode in the history of the state, because revolutionary in principle and anarchistic in execution. It was a proceeding wholly indefensible and completely unpardonable. In the premises, Mr. Bourne was more guilty than the rest, because by reason of his money and his brains, more powerful. He will get small comfort from Benton Republicans, who are themselves orderly, and therefore entirely unwilling to honor a man who has been as disorderly as has Mr. Bourne. In this race for Senator his public record ought to be, and is, his undoing.—Corvallis Gazette.

"Jonathan Bourne, the Champion of the People's Rights!" If that wouldn't give one a pain in the ache! Was Jonathan the "champion of the people's rights" when he had his headquarters in the Eldredge Block during that memorable session of the Oregon Legislature? "Champion of the people's rights!" Does any sane man believe Jonathan would be spreading himself so frantically and extensively if he did not expect to win out in the primaries? Isn't it clear to any thoughtful man that Jonathan expects to make his work and money count and land the nomination, though it be by an insignificant plurality, as THE LEADER has before stated? And, having secured the nomination, isn't it reasonable to suppose that Jonathan expects Republicans to stand by him in June rather than vote for Gearin, the Democratic nominee? Is it any wonder that Democrats consider Statement No. 1 a good thing? Mr. Gearin is a pretty good man, but when party lines are drawn, as they frequently must be in the United States Senate, he does not represent a majority of the people of Oregon, who are Republicans. Republicans who are Republicans do not wish to be half represented by Mr. Gearin or misrepresented by Jonathan Bourne.
