COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Doings of the City Dads in Regular Session.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or., April 2, 1906.

The common council of the city of Toledo met in regular session. Present—Mayor Vincent, Councilmen Arnold, Anderson, Gardner, McCaulou, Fish, Recorder Krogstad and Marshal McElwain; absent Councilman Van Cleve. Minutes of last regular session read and approved.

Following claims against the city read and audited:

On motion claims were allowed.

Moved and seconded that no action be taken on the City Water Company's water rent until until bill for same is presented. Motion lost.

On motion it was ordered that the Toledo Water and Electric Light Co. be allowed water rent in the sum of \$90 for months of January, February and March, 1906, covering five hydrants (excepting the hydrant at schoolhouse.)

On motion it was ordered that in the future all claims against the city must be presented in writing, itemized and certified to, according to the provisions of section 15 of the city charter.

On motion the citizens of Toledo are requested to meet with the Council at its next session for the purpose of discussing and taking action on finishing streets and opening new ones.

Recorder presented receipt from City Treasurer in the sum of \$22.80 for fines, etc., of the past month.

On motion Council adjourned.

It is to be regretted that the speaker touched upon one or two points which might better have been cut out. She has evidently been misinformed. If office-seekers would speak right out in meeting, they might tell her that it is no easier to buy the vote of an Indian in Lincoln county than it is to buy the vote of a white man; they might also inform her that the votes of some Indians are not for sale; this may also be true of some white men. However, this does not lessen the justice of the woman suffrage cause. An intelligent woman is a better citizen and more entitled to the use of the ballot than an ignorant, low down cuss of any color or nationality—and there are more than plenty of this stripe in this wonderful land of the free and home of the brave men who are so much better and wiser than their mothers, wives, daughters, sisters or sweethearts! While local sentiment seems to be strongly in favor of the amendment, a few of our very good male citizens express fear that they will be contaminated if naughty women are permitted to get near the sacred ballot-box. Petition for Dyking District.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Lincoln County.

To the Hon. Board of County Commissioners, for Lincoln County, Oregon: We, your petitioners, whose names are hereinafter affixed, being desirous of forming a dyking district in Lincoln County, Oregon, and embracing the tide lands abutting on Olalla slough and its tributaries in said county and state, respectfully represent and show to this Hon. Court and Board:

That the hereinafter signers are and represent more than one-half of the property owners within said proposed dyking district. We would respectfully show and represent that the hereinafter described lands to be included within said proposed dyking district are subject to overflow by tide water, and that it is desired to form a dyking district for improving by dyking the lands contained therein; that we, the hereinafter signers, are the owners of one-half or more of the acreage to be embraced in said proposed dyking district; that the lands to be embraced within said proposed dyking district are described by legal subdivisions and by metes and bounds, together with the name of the owner, so far as your petitioners have been able to find, as follows:

In the matter of the application of John W. Robertson and others to form a dyking district on Olalla slough in Lincoln county, Oregon.

Now at this time the petition of John W. Robertson and others to form a dyking district including certain lands abutting on Olalla slough and its tributaries in Lincoln county, Oregon, came on to be heard before the Board of County Commissioners of said County and State; and now, after carefully considering said petition and finding to the satisfaction of the Board that the statements therein are substantially correct, it is therefore ordered that the said petitioners shall enter into an undertaking with Lincoln County, Oregon, to the effect that the said petitioners will and shall pay all preliminary expenses connected with the proceedings herein, and as shall be hereinafter found and directed; said undertaking to be to the satisfaction of the Board of Commissioners and by them approved.

It is further ordered by the said Board of Commissioners, that the said petition be published in the official paper of Lincoln county, Oregon, once each week for four successive weeks, together with an order citing all interested parties to appear before the board of Commissioners of said county and state on or before the 5th day of May, 1906, and show cause why the petition should not be granted.

That the first publication of the petition and order as above shall be the 6th day of April, 1906.

It is further ordered that Joseph Blower, J. W. Parrish and John Christensen are hereby appointed by this board, together with the County Surveyor of said county and state who shall proceed to view out the proposed dykes and dams along the most practicable route to accomplish the object desired at the least possible cost and expense and also to define the boundaries of the district and make an accurate list of the land owners within the same, and their lands by legal subdivisions embraced therein, and who shall make plans for, and estimate the cost of the proposed dykes and dams, and shall file with the County Clerk of said county and state at least one week before the date set for hearing said petition and objections thereto.
