The State Treasury.

Now that the primary campaign is about closed, it is pertinent to call the attention of voters to the situation so far as the nomination of State Treasurer is concerned.

Considering the fact that the bulk of the population of the state is located in Multnomah and adjoining counties, it must be apparent to any one that whoever gets the largest vote in that section will surely have a great advantage in the race.

Most of the counties, if not all, have been expecting to get their full share of support in Multnomah county, which, with what they could obtain in the interior counties, would pull them ahead of their competitors.

There is no question whatever, but what the bulk of the vote in that part of the state will be divided between Steel of Clackamas county, and Hoyt, a banker, of Multnomah. The lines now drawn between these leading candidates is practically "The Banks vs The People." It appears that the banking combination is making a determined effort to get control of the treasury; while the masses are lining up against the proposition.

The candidates from the remote part of the state will probably get a good support at home, but the vote at the best is small compared with that in the northern counties, and they will be greatly surprised at the result there. As stated before, they will find that it will mostly go to Steel and Hoyt, thus easily putting them in the lead. Under such circumstances the public can take its choice between the two candidates, unless it does not care who wins, and throw its vote away by casting it for a friend. It would therefore seem advisable to vote for one or the other of these two men, if the voters wish to make their vote count.

"H. M. Cake, who is one of the aspirants for a seat in the United States Senate, is a man fully competent to represent the state," says the Wasco County News of March 16. "Mr. Cake has long been identified with all movements looking to the general welfare of the State, and especially has he been active in movements looking to the opening of the Columbia River. He is generally well known in the state outside of Portland and is generally known as a man who enters all his work in a whole-hearted way that usually accomplishes something."
