Doings of the City Dads in Special Session.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or.,
April 16, 1906.

The common council of the city of Toledo met in Special session. Present—Mayor Vincent, Councilmen Arnold, Anderson, Gardner, McCaulon, Fish, Recorder Krogstad and Marshal McElwain; absent Councilman Van Cleave. Minutes of last regular session read and approved.

Gust Olson presented application for renewal of his saloon license, to take effect on the 10th inst., accompanied by a bond in the sum of \$500, with Wm. F. Enos and Jacob Burkel as sureties; also a receipt from the City Treasurer showing the sum of \$250 had been deposited with him as fee for above license. On motion petition was granted, bond approved and Recorder instructed to issue license.

The following report was handed in by the committee on streets:

"The undersigned street committee beg to submit the following suggestions as to street improvements. We would first suggest that a crossing be put in by which to cross the C. & E. railroad track at or near Mr. Gannon's residence, and that a roadway be graded from this point to the railroad depot, and that an effort be made to interest the railroad company sufficiently to gravel and corduroy the same. Would also suggest that the grade be completed from Hill street to the railroad track on Seventh street.

"In the matter of completion of the grading of Second street between Hill and Grove streets, it should be so performed as to not interfere with the grades on the properties abutting on the north side of the said Second street, and, if necessary, we will permit the property owners to use—feet for sidewalk and other purposes, thereby permitting them to grade from their houses to the sidewalk without endangering said property, we in no way donating this street property to them, but permitting its use until such a time as it may be necessary for us to make use of it for street purposes.

"From Grove to First street we recommend that the present narrow driveway be widened so as to make a practicable road of it; and from Graham to Jones street we recommend that this street be graded and the property owners be requested to give the matter immediate attention.

"The committee is also of the opinion that a suitable route should be found, graded and corduroyed from Hill street to the Toledo cemetery. We would suggest that bids be asked for the grading and the laying of corduroy on as many feasible routes as may be suggested, route and grade required to be left with the party bidding.

On motion the committee on streets was instructed to ascertain what can be done in the matter of securing gravel from railroad company to place on proposed grade on railroad right-of-way.

On motion the report on Second street was deferred for action until next regular session of the Council.

On motion the road out on Hill street and sidewalk to the cemetery was referred to the committee on streets.

On motion the city float at the foot of Second street was condemned and the matter of repairing the same referred to the committee on ways and means. On motion report on Graham street to Jones street on First street was accepted.

On motion Council adjourned.

Our Wild Contemporary.

THE LEADER does not often give space to even a brief notice of the lies, slurs and misrepresentations of disreputable individuals or alleged newspapers, but we apologize to our decent and honest readers for referring to the job of slush contained in last week's Reporter, which begins as follows:

The Courthouse Ring has boycotted the Reporter. In the opinion of the political Boss of Lincoln county the Reporter was a menace to the welfare of the grafters. He is the financial backer of the "Official Organ," the LEADER, and the Reporter was interfering with the profits of that paper.

This is a dirty lie from start to finish. Lincoln county's "political Boss" is a stranger to THE LEADER—in fact, such a person does not exist. The Republican party of Lincoln county has no boss—which is more than the Reporter can say for itself. In fact, the venomous squirt in last week's Reporter was dictated or written by one of that paper's bosses. Any man, be he the editor of the Reporter or one of his bosses, who says that any man is the "financial backer" of THE LEADER is a malicious liar. The editor of THE LEADER has cultivated the habit of attending strictly to his own business, and by so doing has gained the good will of a large majority of the people of Lincoln county. THE LEADER's "financial backers" are its loyal friends in every part of the county.

The Reporter speaks of certain "advertising pamphlets," which "were of such wretched character that they were promptly hidden away when printed." That's another dirty lie. Those same pamphlets have been distributed by the hundreds throughout the eastern states by some of the leading citizens of Lincoln county, and they are doing good work. The Reporter says THE LEADER got \$250 for printing these pamphlets. That's another lie. THE LEADER received for work on these pamphlets \$109.

The Reporter again displays its ignorance and dishonesty by relishing the delinquent tax list printing yarn. It says THE LEADER put a bid last year of 80 cents per square, while the Reporter's bid was 5 cents per square. That's another lie. The Reporter's bid was 25 cents per square. THE LEADER knew its bid would not be accepted, having been informed by the Court that the job would go to the lowest bidder. However, this has but little to do with the case. The Reporter blows about what it has saved the county in this matter. The taxpayers of Lincoln county are not fools. They know that no man who pays his taxes before they become delinquent and are advertised as delinquent pays one cent of the cost of publishing the delinquent tax list. Every cent of this publication fee comes out of the delinquent taxpayer as the item of "costs," and is collected by the Sheriff when the delinquent tax is paid by the owner of the property or when the property is bid in at the tax sale by some other person. These grand-stand plays about saving the county money by publishing the delinquent tax list at a pauper price are becoming stale and ludicrous. If the Reporter had sense enough to ask a white man's price for its work it wouldn't be found bellyaching so much about non-support. The price asked by THE LEADER for publishing the delinquent tax list was less than that paid to any other paper in the state save the Reporter, which has the unenviable distinction of being the champion cheap paper of Oregon. If we were rich, like the editor of the Reporter, and could command such wealthy backing, we could also afford to work for nothing.

The Reporter's funniest as well as its most glittering prevarication is in calling the Newport News a "Republican paper." Perhaps this is one of the Reporter's little jokes.

The Reporter accuses the county officials of withholding from it the publication of land notices. This is a silly charge. County Clerk Ira Wade is the only county official who has anything to do with land office business, and any man who accuses him of discrimination or dishonesty in this matter is another willful liar, and the proof can be produced. THE LEADER secures its patronage of this kind by hustling for it. The Reporter might accomplish more if it would hustle more and rant and rave less.

For political effect the Reporter howls

about graft, but it is noticeably and necessarily silent about a graft in which one of its chief backers is concerned.

But THE LEADER attaches no blame to the editor of the Reporter for any of these lies or misrepresentations. The editor of the Reporter only dances to the music of his fiddling bosses, who are well-known and whose ears are always in sight.

We regret that it is necessary to speak so plainly upon this subject. If this fails to touch the spot, we can make it still plainer. Some of the letters which have been sent from Toledo to various citizens of the county will throw all necessary light upon the matter and reveal to our readers the real ring—which is not the imaginary "courthouse ring."

In the matter of the application of John W. Robertson and others to form a dyking district on Olalla slough in Lincoln county, Oregon.

Now at this time the petition of John W. Robertson and others to form a dyking district including certain lands abutting on Olalla slough and its tributaries in Lincoln county, Oregon, came on to be heard before the Board of County Commissioners of said County and State; and now, after carefully considering said petition and finding to the satisfaction of the Board that the statements therein are substantially correct, it is therefore ordered that the said petitioners shall enter into an undertaking with Lincoln County, Oregon, to the effect that the said petitioners will and shall pay all preliminary expenses connected with the proceedings herein, and as shall be hereinafter found and directed; said undertaking to be to the satisfaction of the Board of Commissioners and by them approved.

It is further ordered by the said board of Commissioners, that the said petition be published in the official paper of Lincoln county, Oregon, once each week for four successive weeks, together with an order citing all interested parties to appear before the board of Commissioners of said county and state on or before the 5th day of May, 1906, and show cause why the petition should not be granted.

Parrish and John Christensen are hereby appointed by this board, together with the County Surveyor of said county and state who shall proceed to view out the proposed dykes and dams along the most practicable route to accomplish the object desired at the least possible cost and expense and also to define the boundaries of the district and make an accurate list of the land owners within the same, and their lands by legal subdivisions embraced therein, and who shall make plans for, and estimate the cost of the proposed dikes and dams, and shall file with the County Clerk of said county and state at least one week before the date set for hearing said petition and objections thereto.
