All the goats were sheared by the first of the week and the mohair was delivered to the station awaiting the sale which took place the 10th. Five bidders were present, W. A. Gellately of Wren, Messrs. Hurt and Cline of Corvallis, H. Metzger of Portland and T. H. Hubbard, representing William Brown & Co., Mr. Pruner of Nashville was also present, and nearly all the parties owning the mohair was on the spot. The mohair was auctioned off shortly after 5 o'clock in the evening, Robert N. Warnock as auctioneer, in which Mr. Warnock proved himself quite competent for the place, and after dwelling on the subject a few moments with all the energy of an old time auctioneer the mohair was sold to the highest bidder—T. There were 4800 fleeces in the pool, 12806 pounds being weighed here and shipped the 11th, total \$4133.96 which is only the mohair at this place. A part of the pool is at Elk City and Summit.
