Council Chamber, Toledo, Or., June 5, 1908.

The common council of the city of Toledo met in special session. Present—Mayor Vincent, Councilmen Anderson, Gardner, McCaulon, Arnold; absent, Councilmen Fish.

On motion, resignation of E. J. McElwain as Marshal, to take effect forthwith, was accepted.

On motion J. A. Hill was appointed Marshal for the unexpired term.

On motion the following claims were allowed under suspension of the rules: E. J. McElwain, salary as Marshal and labor—\$25.00 Toledo Water & Electric Light Co., water rent for April and May—60.00 Otto O. Kroegstad, salary as Recorder—5.00

On motion the remonstrance of Joe Ludwig, Carl Sannes and others against proposed grading of Hill street between Eighth and Ninth, received and filed.

G. R. Schenck was unanimously chosen to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Councilman Van Cleve.

On motion report of committee on ways and means in regard to construction of float at foot of Second street was accepted.

On motion the matter of construction of said float was referred to special committee, consisting of Councilmen McCaulon, Anderson and Arnold, who are empowered to enter into contract with bidders and accept best bid and plans.
