**C. & E. Will Be Extended.**

Wallis Nash, president of the Portland Board of Trade, who has been in New York for the past several months in the interests of the Co-operative Christian Federation, made the announcement yesterday that the work upon the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern Railway across the Cascade Mountains to Eastern Oregon would begin in the near future. He also made public that an independent railroad was to be constructed from Portland to connect with the Corvallis & Eastern at Mehama. Mr. Nash returned to Portland yesterday morning.

"Arrangements for the financing of the railroad have been made and work upon the extension and the new road will begin within a very short time," enthusiastically remarked Mr. Nash yesterday afternoon, when seen at his office. "The extension of the Corvallis & Eastern and the new line will result in the laying of 200 miles of track, and we expect to have all the work completed within three years."

"While in New York I learned that within that space of time three transcontinental lines will probably have made connections with Oregon. They are the Western Pacific, the Moffatt road, and the Chicago & Northwestern."

The company that is to manage the proposed railroad system will be affiliated with the Co-operative Christian Federation, which will control the majority of the stock, provided the arrangements as now planned meet with no unforeseen obstacles. The Co-operative Christian Federation proposes to have settlements both in the Willamette Valley and Eastern Oregon and all along the lines of the new railroad system. The route of the new lines have all been surveyed and the right of way secured.

Mr. Nash brings the information that he has met with much opposition and faced and overcome many obstacles placed in his path since he has been away from Portland. He went to New York shortly after the exposure of the insurance companies, and the subsequent tightening of the money market made it more difficult for Mr. Nash to float his project. Not until three weeks ago did he meet with much encouragement, but as soon as the excitement died down and the money market assumed a fairly normal state he had little difficulty in achieving his purpose.

"I could have financed the deal for four or five times over if I had wanted to," continued Mr. Nash. "Several persons offered to secure the money

with which to build the railroad system provided they could control the majority of the stock. But I went to New York with the determination to float the project in such a manner as to give to Co-operative Christian Federation a control of the majority of the stock, and I succeeded."

"I unfolded the plans of the Federation to many of the leading financial men of New York and they did not hesitate to express their approval. Many of them declare that it is a possible solution of the difference between capital and labor, and the outlook could hardly be more encouraging. These men examined and passed upon many of the features of the great work to be undertaken by the Federation. Some of the prominent men in the East will be associated with us in the Federation. The bonds of the Federation will be sold in small lots all over the United States, but the money for the railroads we get from large financial interests in the East."

The Federation plans to establish several communities in Oregon, the largest of which will be in the Willamette Valley. Employment for 10,000 men will be provided. Many thousand acres owned or controlled by the Federation will be available for such as may desire to purchase and own their own farms, under the influence of the same great principle of co-operation as applied to the farmer's life. Unions will be formed in each district and the members will be entitled to be supplied through the Federation with materials for house-building and implements and equipments and household necessities. On the other hand, as suggested by European precedent, the products of each farm will share in the advantages of common sales and handling."

The 10,000 men of the cities or settlements will be employed in woolen mills, lumber mills, creameries, canneries and factories of all descriptions. Mr. Nash declines to make public the part of the Willamette Valley in which the principal settlement will be located giving as his reason that such an announcement would cause land values in that particular locality to increase, which might interfere with the consummation of the deal for the land.

Capitalists in New York and all through the East regard Oregon as a favored location for profitable investments, declares Mr. Nash. He says that never before has it been so easy as it is now to secure money to be invested in Oregon, and he attributes it to the wonderful exploitation of the resources of this state resulting from the Lewis

and Clark exposition. "At the office of nearly every firm I visited I met men who had attended the Lewis and Clark exposition," said he. "Those men were up on the resources of this state and I was really surprised. In many offices I saw maps of Oregon on which were traced proposed railroads."—Oregonian, July 3.
