A BIG TREE.

What is really one of the striking attractions at the Newport beach, but one that is seldom heard of, is what is called the "Big Trees." The latter are giant firs that tower into the skies from a wooded and shady glen that runs gently back from the beach at Big Creek four miles north of Newport and form a scene in which nature is observed in one of her most radiant moods. The striking feature is the various and unusual forms of tree life at the head of which is an immense fir that five feet above the ground measures more than 38 feet in circumference. It is nearly 13 feet in diameter which means that it is so thick through that lying on its side it would be several feet higher than the ceiling of most residences. An arch way could be cut through its base that would easily permit a team and wagon to be driven through. It is not likely that a cross cut saw was ever made long enough to saw it down. If felled, its stump would be so big that an ordinary man would have to take four or five steps to walk across it. A 54-inch log is a good big one, which means one four foot and a half in diameter. A log cut from the base of this one would be nearly three times as thick.

It is 125 to 150 feet to the first limbs on this leviathan tree. A section of it 144 feet long would make 180,000 feet of lumber. It takes a good sized 16 foot log to make 7,000 feet. The lumber that this one tree would make at \$10 per thousand, and some of it would be worth \$25 to \$30 per thousand, would aggregate, \$1,800. There are many other monster trees in the locality. Few if any fir trees on earth are larger than the one above referred to. A spruce in the Nehalem is said to have a diameter of 19 feet.—Corvallis Times.
