Terrible Earthquake

Last Thursday evening, August 16, there was a tremendous earthquake in South America in which nearly every city in Chile was destroyed. Santiago, Valparaiso, Vena del Mar and other smaller cities were wrecked. Valparaiso, with a population of 150,000, was completely destroyed. Following the shock, as at San Francisco, fires were started which completed the destruction of the city. The loss of lives was heavy, it is estimated that 10,000 people perished and the property losses will run up into the millions.

Timber Fire at Breitenbush

A strip of timber seven miles long and a mile wide, the village of Berry, two logging camps and several mountain cabins have been destroyed by a fierce forest fire which is raging in the Cascade mountains near the terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad. The town of Detroit is now safe, and the railroad bridge across the Breitenbush has escaped destruction. The flames are running eastward on both sides of the North Santiam river from ridge to ridge, through a canyon a mile wide, and a branch of the big fire is running up the Breitenbush river. It is the worst fire ever experienced in that part of the mountains, and nothing but rain can stop it.

The fire started Saturday afternoon and swept four miles of timber in two hours. Everything in the station of Berry, near the mouth of the Breitenbush river was soon destroyed except a big hotel. The buildings burned include a store, some dwelling houses, two old saw mills, not in use, and a bunch of deserted houses and cabins formerly used by a logging camp.

Fanned by a strong wind, the flames ran straight toward the town of Detroit, the terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern, and a village of 200 people. The town is surrounded by a large clearing and this saved it, but for hours smoke was so thick in Detroit that one could not see 20 feet, and the citizens had a hard fight for their homes.

Beautiful Camping Site

Cleanly, well supplied with good well water, under a beautiful grove of oak trees which supply an abundance of shade, close to postoffice and railroad depot, with electric car service every 10 minutes to all parts of the city, grocery store, feed store and in fact every convenience one could desire is the Oregon State Fair camping grounds at Salem. The improvements have worked a miracle in this department of the fair grounds.

Modern sanitary sewerage has been installed throughout the grounds, the trees have been white-washed and present a beautiful appearance. Electric lights by the hundreds have been strung through the camping grounds with a double row over the main walk to the main entrance gates. Thirteen hundred camps upon this site during the fair of 1904 are even more than the average person would estimate after having passed through, but the above number will be greatly increased during the fair of 1906. Arrangements for the leasing of tents have been made, so one can pack in a trunk or two all that will be needed in place of shelter. No one place in Oregon presents so good an opportunity for the "old timers" to meet and enjoy a visit that brings back many of the early and interesting experiences and pleasures of pioneer days. Make up your mind to be numbered among the many camps of a contented and jovial assembly of the Northwest's best people. Leave none at home.

Milking Machines

Ducks, geese, swan—Sept. to Feb. 1.
Grouse, pheasants, all kinds, Oct. 1,
to Dec. 1.
Trout, all species, April 1 to Nov. 1.
Deer—bucks, Aug. 15 to Nov. 1.
Does, Sept. 1 to Nov. 1.
Elk closed until 1907.
Silver gray squirrel, Oct. 1 to Jan. 1.
Beaver prohibited until 1925.
Black bass, no law.
Snipe, no law.

UNLAWFUL
To sell any game.
To kill more than ten upland birds
in one day.
To kill more than 50 ducks, geese or
swan per week.
To catch trout less than 5 inches in
length.
To catch trout other than with hook
and line.
To catch trout by night fishing.
To hunt deer at night.
To kill more than 5 deer in one season.
To hunt game animals or birds with-
out license except upon your own
ground.
License procured from County Clerk
upon payment of \$1, good in any part
of the state.
