The Log Market.

The Willapa Harbor log market is bare of logs. The mills are running from hand to mouth. Fir is bringing \$7.50; spruce, \$6 to \$7.50; cedar, \$6.50. There is only a small quantity of logs in fresh water.

On the Columbia River fir logs are very firm and scarce at \$8.50 to \$11, with a strong demand and an inadequate supply.

On Puget Sound an advance of \$1 per thousand is expected on October 1. The prices now being paid are \$7 for No. 2 logs; \$9.50 for merchantable; \$12 for flooring and decking logs.

On Grays Harbor the recent freshet released a large quantity of logs in the fresh water streams, which has eased up the situation temporarily at least. Fir is bringing \$9.50 for No. 1 and \$6.50 for No. 2; spruce and cedar are worth \$8.50.

In British Columbia the same conditions as govern Puget Sound apply. The Timberman, Portland, Or.


