The Salmon Industry.

"The law restricting fishing to tide-water has done everything for the coast streams," says Master Fish Warden Van Dusen, in his December report to the Board of Fish Commissioners. In the season of 1901 the total number of pounds of salmon of all kinds taken was 4,371,618. The report for the season of 1906 is 8,430,395. The Chinook product shows a gain of 300 per cent over 1901.

Of the 21,662,100 spawn taken at the several coast stream hatcheries during 1906, 4,135,000 are credited to Yaquina. The five Columbia River hatcheries report 14,652,000 more, making a grand total of 36,314,100.

It has been clearly demonstrated that the salmon industry will continue to grow in importance with the maintenance and installing of hatcheries.
