"Al" Hall at Rest.

After months of intense suffering from cancer, J. A. Hall passed away at his home in Toledo, Monday morning, February 25, 1907.

The funeral service, conducted by Rev. Rorick, was held at the family residence Tuesday at 11 a. m., followed by interment in Toledo cemetery.

Joseph Alvin Hall was born May 23, 1850, in Boston, Mass. He was reared principally in Ohio, but spent several years at school in Erie, Pa. When but 17 years of age he enlisted in the regular army in G company of the Eleventh Infantry and three years later was honorably discharged, his term of enlistment having expired. Under the heading, "Character," in his discharge papers, signed by the captain and brevet major commanding the company, are the following words:

"An excellent, honest and faithful man; a good, prompt and efficient soldier."

He traveled extensively throughout the United States and Canada and was an interesting conversationalist.

For three years he was a sailor on the Great Lakes and bore with fortitude the hardships and privations incident to that perilous calling.

In 1875 he was united in marriage at Pleasant Hill, Neb., with Miss Margaret Cummins, the faithful wife who ministered to him in his last sickness. In 1888 he came to Oregon, since which time he has resided principally in Toledo. He acquired and held to the end the highest respect and esteem of his fellow-townsmen on account of his honor as a man and loyalty as a citizen.

New Commissioners' Court Law.

The recent Legislature passed an act cutting out the June and December terms of Commissioners' Court in Lincoln county, which was the proper caper. Following is the law in full:

An Act to fix the terms of the Commissioners' Court in Lincoln county, state of Oregon, to validate the acts of said Commissioners' Court when sitting for the transaction of county business heretofore in said county, and to declare an emergency.

Whereas, There is some doubt as to when the terms of the Commissioners' Court of Lincoln county, Oregon, sitting for the transaction of county business, should be held, and

Whereas, It is necessary that the terms when said Commissioners' Court, sitting for the transaction of county business, should be definitely fixed, therefore,

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the state of Oregon, and

Be it enacted by the People of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. There shall be a term of County Court for the transaction of county business, held in Lincoln county, Oregon, on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in March, May, July, September, November and January in each and every year. Said County Court, sitting for the transaction of county business, shall convene at 10 o'clock a. m. on the days herein mentioned, and shall be conducted by the County Judge and the County Commissioners.

Sec. 2. That all matters, acts or transactions of the Commissioners' Court of said Lincoln county, Oregon, heretofore transacted when sitting for the transaction of county business, shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be legal and binding and of full force and effect, both at law and in equity.

Sec. 3. It is hereby adjudged and declared that existing conditions are such that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and excepted from the exercise of the power of the referendum; and owing to the necessity of definitely fixing the terms of said Commissioners' Court, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its approval by the Governor.

Sec. 4. That all acts and parts of acts in conflict with this act shall be and are hereby repealed.

Circuit Court Changed.

By an act of the late Legislature, the terms of Circuit Court for Lincoln county will hereafter begin on the first Monday in February and August—one month later than in the past. The change was made in the interest of the farmers, who were under the old law compelled to do jury duty during the haying season. The date was changed at the suggestion of Judge Harris.

Fulton Wins.

A dispatch to the Oregonian from its Washington News Bureau, says: The Senate today passed Senator Fulton's bill permitting the Siletz Power & Manufacturing Company right of way across the Siletz Indian reservation. Senator Beveridge, resenting Mr. Fulton's treatment of him, objected to the bill, but the Senate rode over Mr. Beveridge and put the bill through.
