The Ship Subsidy Bill.

The Fifty-ninth Congress ended Monday, the 4th inst., its final act being a temporary knockout of the ship subsidy bill, which has been a bone of contention for several years. The average citizen still believes the proposed law would pave the way for another line of grafting. If American capitalists can see no profit in building vessels and handling the commerce of this country, then let foreigners continue to do the bulk of the business. Americans can build ships and operate them in competition with any country, and they will begin to do it when all prospects of fat subsidies have gone a glimmering. It has been a part of the play in recent years to keep in the spot light the bugaboo of foreign competition in ocean commerce, but a large per cent of the dear people have the Missouri complaint.

The Supreme Court of the United States has decided that any state has the power to declare unlawful any advertising bearing a representation of the American flag. That's sensible. Too many advertisers in all lines are trying to attract the public attention by using the National emblem. Which reminds us that the Spencer Seedless Apple Co. uses a flag border around its ad on an inside page of THE LEADER.

One of the solid old-timers, United States Senator Spooner of Wisconsin, has resigned because he can no longer stand the pace set by his rich colleagues. He has returned to his home to practice law. This proves beyond a doubt that Senator Spooner has more or less conscience. Some men have entered the United States Senate poor and came out on Easy street.

President Roosevelt has created new forest reserves in the United States aggregating 17,000,000 acres, one-fourth of which is in Oregon. Hereafter this bit of authority will be vested in Congress, which, by the way, will also have the power to open the reserves when the time is ripe.

Governor Chamberlain has appointed Gilbert E. Hedges of Oregon City district attorney of the Fifth Judicial district to succeed Harrison Allen, resigned. Mr. Hedges is a Democrat, but has other qualifications which warrant the prediction that he will make good.

Too many Oregon newspapers are devoting valuable space to abuse of the late Oregon Legislature. They overlook the wise acts of our state lawmakers; they forget that the Legislature enacted a law making dogs personal property.

Governor Chamberlain vetoed the bill placing the State Printer on a flat salary because it didn't take effect until 1910. That was proper. The people didn't mean 1910 when they voted on the proposition last June.
