Gust Olson Pleads Guilty.

Gust Olson was arrested Monday evening on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace W. W. Soule charging Olson with selling liquor in violation of the local option law. Gust pleaded not guilty and was given until 10 o'clock Wednesday forenoon to prepare for trial. After pondering over the charge Monday night, Gust concluded he was mistaken, and requested his attorney, C. E. Hawkins, to back up and in his behalf plead guilty. Mr. Hawkins obeyed the order of his client and also offered up a prayer for mercy—in behalf of his client, of course. The Court was duly merciful and tagged Gust with the minimum fine—\$50 and trimmin's, amounting to \$70.

THE symbolism of Easter, supreme among Christian festivals as it indisputably is, is so interwoven with the mysticism of paganism that it is practically impossible to fix definitely upon the origin of some of the legendary observances which have become common property. The genesis of the Easter rabbit, for instance, is involved in much obscurity. It is known that the rodent was used for sacrificial purposes long before the foundation of Christianity, and also that it was an animal sacred to Easre, goddess of light, from whose name our term Easter is supposed to be derived.

How the rabbit became the custodian of the nest of gayly colored Easter eggs is no mystery to the German toymaker. Each district has its own popular variant. Baden's legend is as follows:
In the mountains overlooking Freiburg early in the twelfth century there was an abbey of Benedictines who dominated the spiritual affairs of the entire countryside. At the abbey church the Easter festival was always celebrated with marked splendor, and it was visited on those occasions by the devout from all Germany. One of the chief attractions of the great feast was a series of religious tableaux representing the leading events in the

Scriptural account of the resurrection, and preliminary to this was given a sort of object lesson in the meaning of the mysterious process. In the course of this latter feature a huge nest of beautifully colored eggs—which are symbolic of the resurrection—was the deus ex machina.

On the afternoon of Holy Saturday Father Boniface, the young monk who had charge of this important duty, craved an audience with the abbot of the foundation.

"Alas, my lord," said the young monk dejectedly, "the foxes have eaten every chicken belonging to the abbey. They have, in fact, eaten every chicken in the country, and there isn't an egg to be had for love or money."

"Then why haven't you seen to it that we were rid of the pests?" the abbot asked severely.

"Because your lordship has ordained that no living thing which is mentioned with respect in the sacred Scriptures shall be hurt, and the fox is mentioned therein and almost always respectfully," Father Boniface reminded him.

The Benedictine smiled faintly. "The fox is a sly sinner, but he should not be permitted to outwit a community living under the rule of the blessed Benedict," he said dryly. "In the good old days, my brother, you would have gone directly to heaven with your plaint and not to your abbot."

The young monk betook himself to the chapel and passed the night in vigil. At early dawn he arose from his aching knees and sought the nest which he had left empty. As he approached a snow white rabbit leaped

from the nest, and the delighted monk saw that once again in the history of holy things the sly old fox had been outwitted, for the nest was filled with eggs more splendid in their hues than his feeble art had ever been able to provide.

Oregon Beauties at Jamestown.

Last Sunday's Oregonian presents among a bunch of other Oregon beauties a picture of "Frances E. Simpson of Toledo." Miss Simpson happens to be a resident of Elk City, but, if she does not object, Toledo is willing to claim her. She has been chosen as a member of a company of select young ladies to be costumed and drilled for the purpose of giving Indian drills and song entertainments at the Jamestown exposition.

The company will assemble at McMinnville about the 8th of July for a month's drill and training, which will consist of physical and military drill and manual of arms so far as the same may be exemplified with their six-foot spears. Indian dances and chants in rich Indian costume, fire and ghost dances at night around and through a blaze of colored fire.

On all occasions when not in their Indian drills the girls may be distinguished by their uniform dress and cowboy hat with "Oregon" printed in gold on a red leather band. Their drill costume will consist of light buckskin-colored broadcloth or cravenette, richly trimmed with beads and buckskin fringe with a beaver head design stitched on the pocket.

The city of McMinnville will entertain the girls free during the month's training and contribute liberally toward the expense of the enterprise. The company will start East early in August and will be absent from the state six or eight weeks, if the present program is carried out. The company will create great enthusiasm wherever they go.
