From Ex-Judge Brown.

Melrose, N. M., March 25, 1907.

EDITOR LEADER: I promised several friends that I would write about this country, so if you will indulge me a little I will do so through THE LEADER.

This is what was formerly the "plains," and has been used for grazing purposes until within two years of the present time. It has been isolated from railroads and people knew nothing of its real value until the Santa Fe railroad began building an east and west line through here, and the tide of immigration began. Almost every quarter section for forty miles has been taken and the school land leased.

From one to twelve immigrant cars arrive every day, and within one year a town of about six hundred inhabitants has sprung up.

Other towns are building along the line and the whole country is in a state of ferment. Everybody is busy and seem happy.

Wood and water are difficult to get. Cedar is the only timber, and that is a day's drive away. Coal is the fuel.

Water is from one to three hundred feet beneath the surface. Relinquishments can be bought for from one to five hundred dollars, depending on location and improvements. Farming is yet in its infancy, but those who have been here long enough have demonstrated that plenty of feed of various kinds can be raised.

I have been here about six weeks, and not a drop of rain yet. This is truly a land of sunshine. While this country has many attractions and opportunities, I expect some day to eat clams on Yaquina bay again.

Council Proceedings.

Toledo, Or., April 1, 1907.

The Common Council of the city of Toledo met in regular session. Present—Mayor Soule, Councilmen Avery, A. T. Peterson, Gaither, Rosebrook, H. E. Peterson, and Recorder Krogstad. Absent—Councilman Crosno.

Minutes of last regular session read and approved.

Committee on streets reported progress on all street improvements, but that lack of material and bad weather had interfered with the completion of the work.

Ordinance No. 57 introduced, entitled "An Ordinance to relocate the grade on Fourth street between east side of Hill street and west side of Graham street." On motion above ordinance was read three times and passed by unanimous vote of Councilmen present.

Ordinance No. 58 here introduced, entitled "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 24, which provides for repairing sidewalks and clearing obstructions from same." On motion above ordinance was read three times and passed by unanimous vote of Councilmen present.

On motion the Recorder was authorized to have printed for his use 2000 letterheads and 1000 envelopes.

On motion the City Marshal was instructed to employ the County Surveyor to establish the grade on Third street from Graham street west to the Court-house block.

On motion it was ordered that property owners be notified by publication of contemplated improvement to Fourth street from railroad track to west side of Hill street.

Ordinance No. 57.

An Ordinance to relocate the grade on Fourth street between east side of Hill street and west side of Graham street.

Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Toledo, Oregon:

Section 1. That the grade heretofore established on Fourth street between east side of Hill street and west side of Graham street be relocated to conform with the grade as shown by survey and profile as made and filed by Z. M. Derrick, county surveyor, and filed in the office of the City Recorder on the first day of March, 1907.

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. As Fourth street is nearly impassable, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication or posting.

Passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Toledo, Oregon, this 1st day of April, 1907.

Ordinance No. 58.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 24, which provides for the repairing of sidewalks and clearing obstructions of the same.

Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Toledo, Oregon:

That Section three of said Ordinance No. 24 be amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Any owner of abutting property who shall fail, neglect or refuse to make the necessary repairs to any sidewalk in front of his property within the time specified by Section 1 of this Ordinance, when so notified by the City Marshal, shall be deemed delinquent, and it shall then become the duty of the City Marshal to procure material and make such necessary repairs and file his bill with the City Recorder, who shall enter same in his lien book, as provided in Ordinance No. 8, which expense shall be a prior lien against said abutting property and foreclosed as provided by Ordinance.

Sec. 4. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. Whereas, certain sidewalks need immediate repairs and obstructions removed to protect our people from inconveniences and accidents, this Ordinance shall go into effect immediately after publication or posting.

Passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Toledo, Oregon, this 1st day of April, 1907.
