The referendum is probably a good thing, but it may be easily overworked. For instance:

There is a record-breaking crop of strange faces in Lincoln county. It means population and prosperity, that's all.

Within a few days word may be expected from Washington, D. C., that "Our Binger" is not guilty. However, we shall not be surprised if we are disappointed.

The middle west states were carressed by a cold wave a few days ago, and the fruit crop will probably be light in that country. Meanwhile Oregon is in full bloom; also full of sympathy.

The Standard Oil Company is now charged with dodging taxes on property in Lake county, Indiana, valued at \$37,000,000. Uneasy lies the famous head which wears no crown of hair, the owner of which seems to lie easy.

William Randolph Hearst says the motto of the Democratic party is "Anything to get in." William Randolph ought to know. He has been trying to get in for a long time, but has failed to get wise to the combination.

Permits for buildings aggregating \$1,333,482 were issued in Portland during the first two weeks of April, breaking the city's record for any entire month in its history. Our metropolis is doing well when we remember it was killed by the Lewis and Clark Fair.

The Thaw jurors couldn't agree and the exterminator of Stanford White will remain in jail six months more and then be placed on trial again. Prosecutor Jerome will probably require Evelyn to relate her nice little story again, lest the reading public forget.

Senator Bourne and Congressman Hawley are reported to be pulling together. The latter is probably equipped with a "holdback," as he has it all over the Senator when it comes to pulling or any other strenuous stunt. Oregon's new Congressman and Senator bid fair to make good. Senator Fulton has already done so, and he has had an uphill fight.

By endorsing Secretary Hitchcock's policy of persecution relative to public land matters, President Roosevelt created a large number of warm enemies in Oregon. By going after Harriman et al with the big stick, he is winning a large number of warm friends. However, this third term or second elective term proposition demands a little thoughtful consideration.

The Federal Court jury at Chicago found the Standard Oil Company guilty of taking rebates on 1463 counts, and a fine ranging from \$1,400,000 to \$25,000,000 may be imposed. The Standard has asked for a new trial, which, if granted, may give another jury a chance to declare the defendant as innocent as a sucking dove. The maximum fine of \$25,000,000, however, wouldn't make a dent in the Standard Oil Company's assets.

The Portland Telegram celebrated its 30th birthday Tuesday. The Telegram has come to the front rapidly during the past few years and is a credit to Portland and the state, but THE LEADER must file a kick against its statement in last Saturday's issue that a certain lapidary in Portland is "the only tradesman of his sort in the whole Northwest country." Lincoln county has two experts in that line, both located at Newport, namely, A. L. Thomas and D. S. Young. The former is especially well equipped for the business. Mr. Thomas is an artist in his line and his stone-cutting and polishing machinery is complete and expensive. We are willing to risk a jawbone bet of any size that Mr. Thomas can cut rings around the Portland lapidary. Mr. Young also does fine work, although not so well equipped with machinery.
