Summer School.

The Third Summer Session of Willamette University will open at Newport, on Monday, July 1, and continue until Friday, August 9, inclusive. No exercises will be held on Saturday, unless it is deemed expedient. There will be two departments:

1. Collegiate and Preparatory—Offering instructions in the following subjects: Astronomy, biology, economics, English, French, German, Greek, history, Latin, mathematics, physiology and Spanish.

Each course will consist of thirty class periods or their equivalent in laboratory or field work. Due credit will be given in the College or Preparatory departments for approved work.

2. Normal—Giving instructions in orthography, reading, writing, written arithmetic, English grammar, geography, United States history, theory of teaching, physiology and hygiene, civil government, Oregon school law, English literature, and primary methods. Each course will consist of as many class periods as may be found necessary to complete the work. The courses are designed for the following classes of persons:

1. Teachers in elementary schools and high schools who wish to prepare for state and county examinations.

2. Teachers and all others who seek opportunities for advance study and research in the subjects in which they are especially interested.

3. Students, teachers and others wishing to prepare for the entrance requirements of Willamette University or any other college or to pursue courses leading to a degree.

The regular tuition for work in the Normal courses is \$10, which entitles the student to take two or more subjects for the full term of six weeks.

In the Collegiate and Preparatory departments a charge of \$5 is made for each subject.

The University has selected Newport as the place for holding the Summer Session, because of its unparalleled advantages for study. It is situated on the beach on the north side of Yaquina bay, and is reached by the Southern Pacific and the Corvallis & Eastern railroads, connecting at Albany or Corvallis. Round trip from all points to Newport at greatly reduced rates.

Perhaps nowhere in America are the beauties of sea and land so wonderfully combined. It has been said: "No pen can convey a proper idea of the stupendous grandeur and sublimity of the mighty billows as they dash in fury against the riven-rock shore. No brush can portray the marvelous beauty of the setting sun as it sinks to rest behind the peaceful waters. No tongue can tell the million creatures that live within the vast, mysterious region called the sea, their industry, their quarrels, their combats, and their loves.
