No Compulsion About It.

Democratic newspapers of Oregon are getting a good deal excited over the probability, or possibility, that Republican candidates for the next Legislature will not subscribe to the celebrated Statement No. 1 in its present form. They complain that failure to take Statement No. 1 in its entirety, and to fulfill its provisions whatever the ultimate political consequences, "makes a mockery of a most vital principle, the very soul of the primary law. That is," they say, "the people should rule. Their will should be done when expressed, and the Legislature or Representative should have no contrary will whatever. His sole duty is to do what the people tell him to do, and not otherwise. But these people still bowing down to party would have this reversed. They would disobey the people at the test of the party." The basic assumption of this hysterical argument is that every candidate for the Legislature is under sacred obligation to take Statement No. 1. He is not. He is under no obligation of that kind whatever, moral, legal, personal, political or otherwise. He may do just as he pleases. The primary law says that he may or may not sign. There could be and is no compulsion about it. He is literally and scrupulously within his rights and privileges when he declines to subscribe to Statement No. 1, which is only a formula that is optional with him to adopt or reject.

If the people have any will as to Statement No. 1 they may, and will, of course, exercise it both at the primary and general elections in their choice of Legislative candidates. Suppose that any candidate declines to subscribe to Statement No. 1, or to any statement. He gives public notice of his attitude. The voters at the primary or at the general election may elect him or reject him on that issue, if they please. If they elect him he has a right to assume that his course is indorsed. If they defeat him, that ends it. As a matter of fact, the great majority of the late Oregon Legislature were chosen with no reference as to whether the candidate signed Statement No. 1 or any other statement. Everybody knows it. Of course the members who had signed it felt under obligation to fulfill its terms, and they did it.

"Obey the people." Certainly. "Let the people rule." Of course. But let it be understood clearly once for all that the people do not require anybody to sign Statement No. 1, and they assuredly will never undertake to hold any legislator responsible for "disobedience to their will" who has not signed it.—Oregonian.
