At her home in Toledo, Or., Thursday morning, August 15, 1907, Mrs. Ilona Esper Howell, wife of R. H. Howell, aged 23 years 10 months and 21 days. The news of the unexpected death of Mrs. Howell has caused deepest sorrow among her many friends in Toledo and Lincoln county. She was a woman of irreproachable character and highly esteemed by all who enjoyed her friendship. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Harrison of Beaver Creek and a sister of Miss Adelia Harrison, a popular teacher in the Toledo schools. Other relatives reside at different points in Oregon and Washington. In passing away Mrs. Howell left to her husband a tiny baby girl. The sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the Episcopal church. The Easter Star, of which order deceased was a member, will conduct the burial services at Toledo cemetery.
