New Delinquent Tax Law.

One of the acts of the last legislature which does that body no credit is an amendment to the tax laws which abolishes the provision requiring advertisement in the public prints of any delinquency before same becomes a lien on the property. The law will not become effective upon this year's assessment as it is interpreted, and there will be time for the next legislature to amend it and restore the advertising provision, which is a safeguard in the interest of the property owner and against the tax title shark, who wants as little publicity as possible in his transactions.

Under the old law, delinquent taxes had to be advertised before becoming a lien on the property, and at delinquent sale anyone was allowed to pay the taxes and receive a provisional title, redeemable by prior owner within three years. The new law abolishes the advertising feature, but provides that when the tax becomes delinquent any one may pay the amount due, with 15 per cent penalty added, and receive a certificate which entitles him to possession in case prior owner fails to redeem the certificate with interest before the expiration of three years. It was voted as the sense of the association that the certificate plan does not apply to the 1907 levy.—Ashland Tidings.
