Now Mr. Merchant or Business Man, or any one who thinks that it does not pay to advertise, but thinks that what he pays for advertising is just so much money thrown away—just advertises to help keep the editor from starving—don't you know that an advertisement in your local paper telling what you have for sale, is a standing invitation to the public to call and inspect your wares? This is especially true of the newcomers. About the first thing he does is to look through the local paper and see who has for sale the articles which he wishes to purchase, and he is certainly going to patronize the merchant who has the nearest ad inviting his patronage and once he starts trading at a certain place of business, as long as they treat him right, they are not going to lose him. Of course if you have an ad in the paper and never change it, but have the same thing year after year, it will not attract much attention or draw much trade from the home people. But if you would change your ad every once in a while, when you think of it, you will find that it will do good with old as well as new customers. We wish to make it plain to everyone that we don't want them to advertise for sweet charity's sake—to help the poor editor—but for their own sake and their business' sake.

We have put our advertising on a fair business basis and now all pay an equal rate. While some of our patrons had to pay a little more per month than formerly, the most of them didn't complain as they could see that all were not getting a square deal when some paid nearly double the amount that someone else did for the same amount of space.

In Col. Parker's article on Lincoln county in the Oregonian last week he stated that we have no promotion clubs in this county. Yes we have. Several months ago our people met and organized the Toledo Development League, which has done good work, is doing good work and expects to do more good work.
