Record prices for Oregon fruit are reported from many portions of the state.

\$4,275,135. is the amount the fruit growers of Oregon will receive for their crop for the present year, as estimated by the Hon. W. K. Newell, President of the State Board of Horticulture. In making his estimate Mr. Newell does not deal with fancy prices, nor does he include the fruit that will be consumed on the farm.
