Chapman of Nashville, Oregon, find that deceased came to his death from a gunshot wound in the head, producing instant death, inflicted by his own hands during a fit of temporary insanity."

The program was carried out by two girls sitting at a table with a bowl of water between them in which floated a match. The men were so mad they had declared a boycott on the girl's parties.

Toledo Development League.

Council Chamber, Toledo, Or.
October 26, 1907.

Toledo Development League met in regular session, President C. H. Gardner presiding. Full quorum present. Minutes of last special meeting, of August 24th read and approved.

General discussion on the matter of seeking our rights before the State Railway Commission. Moved by Mr. Crosno and seconded by Mr. Hawkins that our Secretary be instructed to telegraph the Hon. B. F. Jones at Independence our wishes as a body, and for him to present the same before the meeting of the Railway Commission on the 1st of November, next. Above motion carried.

Following bills were allowed:
Launch Ella May, trip to Newport, \$5;
C. H. Gardner, meals for party, \$2.50;
M. N. Anderson, livery rig, \$4; F. M. Stanton, rig, \$4; LEADER, printing bills, \$1.00.

Moved by Mr. Crosno and seconded by Mr. Bathers that we appoint a committee of five, including the Executive Committee, to furnish our representatives in Congress with such information concerning our harbor, the bay country and its resources as may be required. Carried.

As additional members of above committee were appointed Messrs. Lee Wade and the Secretary.

Moved and seconded that November 4th be set as the date for inviting Senator Fulton to visit us. Carried.

Mr. Stewart having resigned from the Reception Committee, Mr. Schenck was appointed to take his place.

Moved and carried that a committee of three be appointed to prepare descriptive matter advertising our resources and to submit a copy at next meeting for approval. Chairman appointed on aforesaid committee Messrs. Schenck, Collins and Avery.

Moved and seconded that we heartily endorse the action of the farmers and orchardists of this county in taking the timely step toward the formation of a horticultural society to look after the increasing fruit industry of this section. Carried.

It was the sense of this meeting that the Proceedings of the League be published in our local papers.

It was moved, seconded and duly carried that we send to the Oregonian of Portland an article remonstrating against its recent published article entitled "The Land of Nod," in which some untruths are told and slurs thrown at our county. That Mr. Stewart be entrusted with the writing of said remonstrance.

Receipts for dues and membership fees, \$9.

League here adjourned.

Obstructions in the Yaquina.

The following letter to the Secretary of War written by B. F. Jones, our State Representative, is self explanatory:

Independence, Or., Oct. 28, 1907.
To the Hon. Secretary of War.
Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:—On or about the 11th day of September, 1900, I addressed a letter to your department, stating that F. C. Barnes and others were obstructing navigation on the Yaquina river with piling. Immediately thereafter your department notified the parties to remove the piling and they at once complied with your request, and since that time no obstructions have been placed in the Yaquina river by any person or persons, or corporation, save and excepting the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company.

I desire to call your attention to the fact that the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company has its track along the Yaquina river and bay in Lincoln county, Oregon, for a distance of about thirty miles, and that at times during the winter season large bodies of earth, rock, brush and timber slide down on the railroad right-of-way. For the past twenty years the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company has been removing said earth, rock, brush and timber and depositing it in the navigable waters of the said Yaquina bay. That during the past twenty years have been thousands of tons of said earth, rock, brush and timber deposited in said navigable waters of the Yaquina bay.

That by reason of said earth, rock, brush and timber drifting down the bay, it has formed bars at numerous places, especially from a point one and one-half miles above the city of Toledo to a point three miles below said city, on Yaquina bay, until at the present time river boats can scarcely reach Toledo except at high tide, whereas, in the past ocean plying vessels have loaded at Toledo with lumber for San Francisco and other coast points.

Unless some steps are taken by the War Department to compel said Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company to desist from removing said earth, rock, brush and timber into Yaquina bay navigation on the upper bay will soon be a thing of the past.

I called the attention of our representatives in Congress to this matter soon after I filed the complaint in the Barnes case, but so far no action has been taken, and the Company continues to deposit the said earth, rock, brush and timber in said bay.

Notice to Road and School Districts.

Meetings for the purpose of voting special levies should not be called to meet for such purpose before the first week of December, for the reason that the assessment of all the property within all of said districts has been greatly increased, and as the Board of Equalization meets on the 3d Monday of October and continues in session for a period of 30 days, no certificate from the County Clerk, showing the total value of the assessable property within said districts can be furnished until said Board has completed its labors of correcting said roll and has adjourned. All notices of special levies must be filed with the County Clerk on or before the 1st day of January.
