Council Proceedings.

Toledo, Or., Nov. 8, 1907.

The Common Council of the city of Toledo met in adjourned session. Present—Councilmen Avery, H. E. Peterson, Rosebrook, Croson and A. T. Peterson, and Recorder Krogstad. Absent—Mayor Soule, Councilman Gaither.

In the absence of the regular Mayor, A. T. Peterson was on motion chosen Mayor pro tem.

Minutes of last regular session of October 7, special session of October 16 and regular session of November 4, read and approved as read.

Owing to the inability of Street Committee to get together, they asked for further time in which to pursue their duties. Moved the Committee be allowed further time in which to complete report on west end of Fourth street.

Following claims presented and allowed:

F. J. McElwain, salary as Marshal, \$10.00

O. O. Krogstad, Recorder's salary, 3.00

Fir and Spruce Lumber Co., lumber for crossings, 1.50

Gardner & Jorgenson, nails and hardware, 3.35

Resignation of Joe A. Hill as Marshal presented. On motion above resignation accepted.

Moved and carried that we appoint to serve as Marshal in place of Joe A. Hill, resigned, F. J. McElwain to serve for the unexpired term until next city election.

The present salary of our Marshal of \$10 per month being deemed inadequate for such service, it was moved and carried that the Marshal's salary until next city election be raised to \$20 per month.

The time for city election drawing nigh the following Judges of Election were appointed: R. A. Arnold, T. H. Horning and G. A. Hall.

A committee from the Fire Department waited upon the Council requesting that the fire bell be elevated and the tower raised sufficiently to clear the roof of the building, also that the door or approach to fire apparatus room be changed so as to avoid present high step at entrance. Matter referred to Committee on Fire and Police.

Moved and carried Marshal be instructed to notify property owners on Hill street to remove forthwith all wood, rubbish and obstructions on sidewalks and planking.

On motion Council adjourned.

In Master Fish Warden Van Dusen's report to the Board of Fish Commissioners we find the following: "During the past couple of years, we have had considerable complaint from the residents above our permanent rack at the Yaquina Hatchery, claiming that the rack interfered with their running logs down the river, and to obviate all such complaints in the future we have just finished a log gate-way that we have put in through the rack, that is nine feet wide in the clear and should be sufficient to pass through, at ease, the largest timber that is ever floated down that fork of the river. The matter of putting in this log-way with out weakening the rack and making it ineffective was quite an undertaking and has cost the department near \$600.00

Toledo, Or., Nov. 5, 1907.

Toledo Fire Department met in regular session, President Schenck in the chair.

Minutes of the last meeting of September 3, read and approved.

Roll call and absentees noted.

Moved and carried that the members failing to respond to the fire calls of November 3 and 4 be excused from fines.

Two members paid fines for absence at last meeting.

Moved and carried the Secretary notify all members absent the last three or more meetings to appear at next regular meeting and give reasonable excuse for said absence or their names will be dropped from the roll.

The committee on hook and ladder truck requested to call a meeting and draw plans and prepare to build the hook and ladder truck.

Chair appointed a committee of three to confer with the City Council at its next meeting, in regard to fixing the front of the City Hall so hose cart can be taken out; to raising of the fire bell, etc. President appointed R. A. Arnold, G. A. Hall and F. W. Carson.

Moved and carried the chair appoint a committee of three to confer with a dealer in badges with a view to buying badges for the department. Chair appointed E. J. Avery, J. A. Peterson and Fred Stanton.

Moved and carried a committee of three be appointed to arrange for an entertainment for the wives, daughters and sweethearts of the Department, and to induce new members and to organize a coffee club. Chair appointed R. E. Collins, Fred Stanton and R. A. Arnold.

Senator Fulton's Visit.

Monday evening Toledo was honored by a visit from United States Senator C. W. Fulton. A reception was held for him at Woodmen Hall under the auspices of the Toledo Development League, on whose invitation the Senator came. A large number of our citizens were present to welcome Mr. Fulton.

Senator Fulton's visit here was to become more fully acquainted with the conditions in this part of the state before returning to Washington, D. C. In his address he told what we could and could not expect the next Congress to do in the way of improvements of our rivers and harbors. He outlined his policy in regard to rivers and harbors and promised to do his utmost to have Yaquina bay harbor as well as other harbors on the coast improved. He will make a special effort at the coming session of Congress to have Alsea bay and river surveyed with a view to having improvements made.

Mr. Fulton departed Tuesday morning for the Valley. He expressed regret at not having time to visit other points in the county.

Two Fires in Toledo.

What came near being a serious fire and threatened for a time the whole business district of Toledo occurred last Sunday night. About eleven o'clock Frank Stardevant in passing O. O. Krogstad's drug store noticed an unusual bright light in the rear room of the store and on investigating discovered the room filled with smoke. He immediately gave the alarm, and the fire bell brought the firemen and others, who, after a hard fight extinguished the flames, which had by this time enveloped the room. It was miraculous that the whole building did not burn. Between 75 and 100 gallons of oil were in the room and in the midst of the fire but fortunately did not catch fire. Several thousands of rolls of wall paper were also in the room and was badly scorched and smoked. The shelving and all woodwork on the partition wall dividing the store and rear rooms was all burned. A few second's delay on the part of the fire company would have resulted in the total destruction of the building in which is the dry goods store of J. S. Akin, the Oddfellows' hall, Dr. Humberstone's dental parlors and several rooms occupied by families. The loss to Mr. Krogstad and Mrs. Ofstedahl, the owner of the building, will reach \$500 or more. The cause of the fire is unknown, but is presumed to have started from combustion.

The following afternoon at 4 o'clock the fire bell again called the firemen to the residence of Mrs. Elma Hyde at the corner of Hill and Graham streets. The roof had caught fire from a stove pipe and for a time it seemed the house would be consumed. The piano and other furniture was nearly all carried out of the lower rooms but all up stairs was damaged by smoke and water. The roof was practically destroyed. The loss to Mrs. Hyde was considerable.

The members of the fire department, while these two calls were the first experience for many of them in fighting fires, did good and quick work, and are to be commended on the manner in which they responded to the calls.
