The Judge Answers.

District Attorney McFadden of Corvallis in answering, in an Albany publication, an attack on him in regard to the arrest and fining of Dr. Carter of Newport for violating the local option law, says:

"The writer of the article referred to on the first page of the October issue has evidently been misled as to facts about Dr. Carter's arrest and conviction. The facts are briefly that Dr. F. M. Carter sold a Norwegian two quarts of Salem beer for the sum of fifty cents and made no claim whatever of having given any prescription for the same. In fact, the indictment alleges that he sold the same for beverage purposes without a prescription. The Doctor was not charged with selling whiskey at all and the record will so show. There is no question whatever that Dr. Carter has been bootlegging over there and I am not done with him yet. I know not what the Doctor may have said or written, if anything, about the matter but the truth is that knowing that he was guilty as charged he simply squawked. Therefore, the statement in the article referred to 'the person who had received the whiskey, evidently by misrepresenting the Doctor, went before the authorities and had the Doctor arrested.' This statement has no foundation in fact and is wholly false. I put the Norwegian under oath and he simply admitted the fact to be that he had purchased from Dr. Carter two quarts of Salem beer for the sum of fifty cents and the Doctor wishing, to avoid notoriety, as he is a high moral light, a God morality man, an advocate of local option and temperance in all their ramifications didn't care to be confronted by the crew of the Ella May, who had also patronized him for his beverage purposes, concluded on his own motion to plead guilty."
