The meeting called for Tuesday, December 3, for the purpose of organizing a horticultural society, should be well attended by farmers and fruitgrowers from every section of the county. Such an organization is what we need and must have.

The forty-sixth star was added to the Flag last Saturday, November 13, when, by proclamation of President Roosevelt, Oklahoma was admitted to statehood. The new state has an area of 70,430 square miles; property values exceed \$1,000,000,000; has 6,000 miles of railroad; cities ranging in population from 5,000 to 40,000; the Indian population of the state is 89,000, comprising Cherokees, Choctaws, Chickasaws, Seminoles and Cherokees.

Our esteemed friend Dr. Carter and our efficient and highly honored District Attorney Judge McFadden are using up lots of good white paper and printers' ink in a wordy controversy over the conviction of the worthy Doctor for the violation of the local option law last summer. With all due respect to the honorable District Attorney and to the dignity of the law he represents, we would respectfully submit that a more vigorous prosecution of violators of the local option law, of which there are not a few, and a little less newspaper work would give the law abiding citizens of Lincoln county much more satisfaction, as much as they admire the Judge's caustic writings.

One of the principal objects of Mr. Hume's trip to Wedderburn this season of the year was to attend a gathering of local capitalists at Coos Bay to organize a company to build and operate a passenger steamer to run between Yaquina, Siuslaw, Umpqua, Coos Bay, Coquille, Port Orford, Rogue River, Smith River, Crescent City, Trinidad and Eureka. The boat will make regular runs and will connect with Klamath. The craft will cost upwards of \$50,000, will be speedy and up-to-date, and will fill a long felt want along this portion of the coast, with headquarters at Coos Bay.
