Secretary Walter Lyan, of the chamber of commerce, has on exhibition in the window on Front street, the first newspaper ever published in Oregon. It is the property of Mrs. Matson, of this city, and is a real historic rarity. The paper is a four page issue of four columns and was printed at Oregon City, February 5, 1846. The country was then a territory, but the editor, W. G. T. Vault, was in those long past days as optimistic regarding the future of the country as are the present inhabitants, and his theory was that it was destined to become a great commonwealth. The paper has passed through many hands, having been sent east via the Isthmus of Panama by a man from The Dalles to a relative in Iowa. It was brought across the plains later on by a woman, and finally fell in Mrs. Matson's hands. Mrs. Matson has it framed in a mounting which gives the interested person a view of both sides and all four pages of the issue.—Marshfield Times.
