The Pomelo of China.

Probably the best all round fruit in China is the pomelo. It is grown in the south central and southern provinces and is said to be the original citrus fruit. It resembles the grape fruit of the United States in size, shape, color and somewhat in flavor, being sweeter than grape fruit, with less of the bitter quality, with flesh more perfectly separated in the sections and capable of being pulled apart and separated from all surrounding sacs or membranes. The natives cut through the peel about one-third of the way from the top, crimping the edge of the section all the way round the fruit, then remove the flesh, tear the section apart, replace them in the peel and serve thus divided and prepared. The fruit is attractive, refreshing, wholesome and comparatively cheap. Generally speaking, the pomelo seems to be a cross between a shaddock and a good orange, but it is more hardy than either. It has better keeping qualities than the orange.

Some Real Giants.

Brewer tells us that "no recorded height of any giant known has reached ten feet." If a cubit is twenty-one inches, Goliath of Gath was eleven feet nine inches in height; if it is eighteen inches, he was just the size of the Arabian giant, Gabara, who was nine feet nine inches. Josephus mentions a Jew who stood ten feet two. Kintolochus Rex was fifteen feet six inches high, five feet through the chest to the spine and ten feet across the shoulders. John Middleton was nine feet three inches. His hand was seventeen inches long and eight and a half broad. Patrick O'Brien was eight feet seven. Turner, the naturalist, says he saw in Brazil a giant twelve feet in height. But Og, king of Bashan, held the record. According to tradition, he lived 3,000 years and walked beside the Ark during the flood. One of his bones formed a bridge over a river.

In the Doldrums.

We may hear it said of one who is in low spirits, "he is in the dumps," or "he is in the doldrums," but many who use the latter of these phrases have caught it up without any knowledge of its real significance. The region of calms is a belt which stretches across the Atlantic and Pacific almost on a line with the equator. Here meet the north and south trade winds, and squalls and heavy rains are frequent, but the characteristic of this region, which is known also as the doldrums, is an oppressive calm. The name nowadays loses much of the significance attached to it by sailors in the past, who, if their ships ran into that region, might whistle in vain for wind, as their sails hung heavily, and all seemed to be

Warding Off Old Age.

A famous French general when asked how it was that he had such an erect carriage replied that it was because he bent over and touched the floor with his fingers thirty times every day. If he had acquired rigidity of the spine so that he could not do that he would have had with it weak abdominal muscles, which result in portal congestion. The Little Giant.

Colonel Clark E. Carr met Senator Douglas during the time of the famous Lincoln and Douglas debates and thus describes him in his book, "The Illini": "I had never heard so impressive a voice, so deep and sympathetic. He had a sort of confiding way, as much as to say, 'I am going to tell you—I feel that I can trust myself to say to you, as though you were the one person in whom he could confide. He was only five feet four and was well called 'the little giant.' I was astonished to find he had so good a figure."

Hymns in Theaters.

In South Wales when the people are pleased with the work of an actor they have a custom of showing their appreciation by singing hymns at the close of the performance. Henry Irving was once playing at Swansea when he was surprised to hear the audience burst into "Lead, Kindly Light," when he appeared before the curtain in response to a call. At the close of the engagement the great actor was deeply touched by the singing of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," rendered in the most reverent manner.

So Long.

With respect to the origin of the familiar parting salute, "So long," there is a suggestion that it is derived from the Norwegian "Saa laenge," a common form of farewell, equivalent in meaning to "au revoir," and pronounced like "so long," with the "g" softened. There was a fair number of Norwegians among the settlers in America, to judge by names, and it is quite likely the phrase was picked up from them. It is in general use among the Dutch in South Africa.—London Globe.

A LONG LOST CITY.

Tanagra, the Site of the Modern Town of Gremada, in Greece.

Gremada is the name of the modern city in Boeotia, Greece, which occupies the site of the ancient city of Tanagra. The old town was a rich and luxurious place, greatly renowned for the cock-fights that were given there. It had the honor of being the birthplace of Corinna, the great poetess of the fifth century before Christ, and perpetuated her memory by a majestic tomb, on which she was represented five times crowned in remembrance of the five victories which she had gained in the lyrical contests with Pindar. Despite this comparative celebrity it appeared destined to the eternal sleep of forgetfulness when after more than twenty-two centuries of silence chance drew to it the attention of archaeologists.

In 1870 the inhabitants of the neighboring villages while digging in their fields exposed to view some tombs which the French have assigned to the nineteenth century before the Christian era. The discovery of these first sepulchers was the cause of excavations, during which a quantity of other tombs were discovered, all situated along the roads which led from the walls of Tanagra in the direction of Thebes, Chalcis, Harnia and Plataea.

Among this mass of tombs belonging to several centuries the most interest attaches to those of the fourth century before the Christian era on account of their contents. It was in these particularly that the statues known today under the name of "Tanagra figurines" were for the most part discovered.
