In the matter of the report of Sheriff for six months ending Sept. 30, 1907. Report accepted and approved.

In the matter of the semi-annual report of G. B. McCluskey, as County Treasurer. Report accepted and ordered filed.

In the matter of the semi-annual report of Ira Wade, as County Clerk. Report accepted and placed on file.

Report of P. A. Thompson, relative to repairs on Big Elk river by George Hodges, accepted and filed.

Report of W. H. Moore, expending county records, received and approved and ordered placed on file.

In the matter of repairing Dayley bridge near West Yaquina. Ordered that Commissioner Fogarty be authorized to inspect said bridge and if same can be repaired for less than \$200.00 that he proceed to cause said bridge to be repaired and report to this Court at its next term relative to same.

In the matter of the School Library Fund of Lincoln county: At this time it duly appears to the Court that there has been collected by the tax collector and deposited with the County Treasurer of said county the sum of \$138.98 as a School Library Fund for said county which said sum has been entered by him in the County Fund of said county, it is therefore ordered by the Court that said sum be transferred from the County Fund to the School Library Fund of said county, and it is further ordered that any and all other sum or sums so received for School Library purposes by said Treasurer be entered in the School Library Fund of said county.

In the matter of repairing the Toledo-Siletz wagon road: It duly appearing to the Court that certain parts of this road is in a dangerous condition and needs immediate attention, it is hereby ordered by the Court that the sum of \$50 be and the same is hereby appropriated from the General Fund for the repair of said road. It is further ordered that B. F. Swope, as County Judge, be authorized to employ some competent person to so improve said road to the extent of said sum of \$50 at the rate of 22½ cents per hour, and to perform such other acts as in the premises may be necessary.

In the matter of the Road Fund of Lincoln county. It duly appearing to the Court that there is now in the Road Fund in the hands of the County Treasurer the sum of \$560.56; that there is not now a road tax levied in said county for road purposes, but the money for road improvements is now taken from the County Fund; and it further appearing that said sum of \$560.56 is now tied up and cannot, or is not, being used for road purposes or otherwise. It is ordered by the Court that said sum of

\$270.56 be transferred to the County Fund.

In the matter of the Indigent Fund of Lincoln county. It appearing to the Court that there is now in this fund \$9.70, and that said sum is tied up, it is ordered that the County Treasurer transfer said sum of \$9.70 to the County Fund.

In the matter of the Indemnity Fund. Ordered that the sum of \$5.45, now in the Indemnity Fund, be transferred to the County Fund.

In the matter of the delinquent tax roll for the year 1906: At this time came on for consideration the delinquent tax roll for the year 1906, together with the Sheriff's statement compiled therefrom and with his certificate attached thereto from which it appears to the Court that the total amount of taxes collected for said year is \$4251.51; the total amount of double assessments and other errors is \$1540.80; the amount of Sheriff's assessments collected and uncollected is \$1028.11, and all other matter affecting his said return on said tax roll, and it further appears therefrom that said Sheriff struck a balance thereon between the total of the tax list as given him and the total collections, less such errors and other matters therein stated, which balance is \$4576.43; and it further appearing to the Court therefrom that the amount of taxes so returned as unpaid and doubly assessed is \$4576.43; now, therefore, the Court being fully informed in the premises and having carefully examined said list and certified statement, it is ordered that the Sheriff be and he is hereby credited with said amount of taxes so returned and unpaid and doubly assessed in the sum of \$4576.43.

In the matter of the delinquent tax roll for the year 1906: It is ordered that the Clerk return to said Sheriff said roll, with a warrant under the seal of this Court, commanding him to levy upon the goods and chattels of the delinquent taxpayers, etc. It is further ordered that said Sheriff pay over all moneys collected from said 1906 tax roll to the Treasurer of said county, as by law required, and it is further ordered that said Sheriff execute said warrant and make due and legal return thereon in form and manner as by law required.

In the matter of the delinquent tax roll for the year 1906: It is hereby ordered that the County Clerk advertise for sealed bids for publishing the delinquent tax sale for the year 1906, said sealed bids to be filed with the Clerk on or before January 1, 1908; also state in said advertisement for sealed bids, that the Court retains the power to reject any or all bids.

Court adjourned until next regular term in January, 1908.
