This idea strikes the very keynote of excellence in production. It is safe to say that the attainer of wormy or scaly fruit will not be fastened to any self-respecting grower's name and that the farm that he advertises as his own will be a credit to him through its products.—Oregonian.

It would enable each grower to get credit for his labors and would also create a demand for his fruit, as by having his name on his boxes it would guarantee the purchaser against getting bad fruit, and as the Oregonian says, if your neighbor shipped scabby and wormy apples, he would get the credit, and not the whole community.
