In the matter of the General Tax Levy for the year 1907. At this time came on for consideration the matter of estimating the amount of money to be raised for county and other purposes for the year 1907, and making a levy to raise said amounts upon all taxable property in the county, and the Court having carefully examined into said matter finds, that the expense of running county affairs, including county roads will be \$14,000; interest on said county's indebtedness will be, \$2,000; amount to be paid to the state of Oregon, \$6325; public schools, \$9163; school libraries, \$130; that the total assessed valuation of all taxable property in said county is \$2,584,124; therefore, based upon said estimated expense, it is ordered that the following levy be and the same is hereby made for the year 1907, to wit: For county purposes .011 on the dollar, for state purposes, .0025, for school purposes, .0036 and for school library, .00006 on the dollar.

Petition of Samuel Elmore for settlement of taxes, rejected.

Petition of John F. Ditzman relative to taxes, rejected.

Petition of Anton Redewski et al, for road, continued.

Petition of Oscar B. Playter for rebate of taxes, continued to March term.

Petition of A. T. Peterson et al, petition for county road, rejected.

Petition of N. L. Leabo, et al to maintain county road from West Yaquina to South Beach, Seal Rock and Alsea Bay and to repair Daly bridge. Petition continued and ordered that Charles Hassman rebuild said Daly bridge for the sum of \$199 and he is to furnish all labor and material thereon at his own expense.

In the matter of repairing approach to Yaquina Bay from West Yaquina. Ordered that road district No. 7 purchase 2600 feet of lumber, per statement filed herein, and deliver same at said approach, also 1 1/2 kegs of spikes with express understanding that the

residents of said district build said approach free of all cost to the county.

Petition of M. G. Lyons, et al to enlarge voting precinct in road district No. 19, dismissed.

Resignation of J. A. Hill as supervisor dist No. 8, accepted.

Petition of F. B. Roberts et al, to declare Siletz river a public highway, continued.

Remonstrance of Fir & Spruce Co., et al, against petition of F. B. Roberts, et al, continued.

Petition of Carlo Minotti, et al, to put Mr. and Mrs. Chance in care of county. Ordered that \$20 for month of January be drawn in favor N. J. Goodman for benefit of Mr. and Mrs. Chance.

Petition of J. A. Wilkins for rebate of taxes, granted.

Petition of Joel Stull, to eliminate taxes under name of Joell Stull for year 1906, dismissed.

Petition of Estella Peterson, relative to taxes, dismissed.

Petition of C. B. Crosno, relative to taxes granted.

Petition of C. E. Hawkins relative to taxes, dismissed.

In the matter of the special road tax in district No. 9. It duly appearing to the court that at a meeting of the legal voters of said district a special road tax of two mills on the dollar was levied, it is ordered that the Supervisor of said district prepare plans and specifications of said proposed road improvements, as in the notice to this court submitted; further ordered that the County Clerk enter said assessment or levy upon the tax roll for the year 1908 in manner and form as by law provided.

In the matter of the special road tax in road district No. 4. The legal voters of said district having levied a tax of 5 mills for special road tax, it is ordered that the levy be placed upon the tax roll of 1908.

Petition of J. H. Bones, et al, for the creation of a new road district, granted, and said new road district to be designated and numbered "Road district No. 16." In the matter of the appointment of a Fruit Inspector for Lincoln county, Oregon.

At this time came on for consideration the petitions of S. G. Irvin, D. B. Ramsdell and C. W. Harding asking to be appointed Fruit Inspector for Lincoln county, Oregon, and after duly considering each of said petitions, the court finds that the petitions of both D. B. Ramsdell and C. W. Harding are ineffective and do not comply with the law in this, that under section 1, Chapter 222, session Laws of 1905 for the state of Oregon, the Fruit Inspector to be appointed must be recommended and certified to be competent for such position by the State District Commissioner of the State board of Horticulture for said county, and neither of said applicants were recommended by said Officer.

The court further finds that the petition of S. G. Irvin is in due form, signed by the requisite number of fruit growers and is endorsed with the recommendation and certificate of said state officer as by law required. The court further finds that when such a petition is filed herein the law makes it mandatory on the court to appoint such a fruit inspector for this county; therefore, the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that said S. G. Irvin be and he is hereby appointed Fruit Inspector for Lincoln county Oregon, to serve as such officer during the pleasure of this court.

In the matter of the appointment of Justice of the Peace of Siletz precinct. John Newberry appointed to fill vacancy.

In the matter of special road tax in road district No. 19, wherein a levy of 5 mills was made by the legal voters of said district, it is ordered that County Clerk enter said levy upon the tax roll for the year 1908.

While playing on the logs in the boom of the Fir & Spruce Lumber Company last Saturday afternoon, with several other small boys, little Nelson Anderson, six years old, fell into the water and would have been drowned had not it been for the presence of mind of his brother Stanley, aged 11, and cousin Lester Hall, aged 8. When the little brother fell in Stanley, without a second's hesitation, jumped into the water, which at that point was 10 or 15 feet deep, and managed to catch Nelson by the hair by which he towed him to a log. Stanley succeeded in getting onto the log himself but could not get his brother out. By bracing himself he succeeded in keeping the log from rolling over, and in this position held the younger brother's head above water while Lester ran to town and got help. The boys were in the water at least fifteen minutes, and were nearly exhausted when help arrived.

Stanley deserves great credit for risking his life to save his brother's, and by the act proved the metal that is in him. No man could have done better.
