County High School.

At the meeting of the Toledo Development League last Saturday evening the proposition of a County High School was taken up. A committee was appointed to circulate a petition asking the County Court to have placed upon the ballot at the coming June election the proposition as to whether the voters of this county desire a county high school. The following taken from the Oregon School Laws, section 220, says: "The county court, at any general election to be held in any county after the passage of this act, upon the presentation of a petition signed by one hundred or more qualified electors, tax-payers of said county, must submit the question of establishing and maintaining a county high school to the qualified electors thereof. The ballots for such election shall contain the words, 'For County High School—Yes;' 'For County High School—No;' and the voter shall indicate his choice as provided in the Australian ballot law."

Section 221 says "If the majority of all votes cast on the proposition to establish a county high school are in the affirmative, it shall be the duty of the county court, within thirty days after canvassing said vote, to locate said school in some suitable and convenient place in said county. The county court shall also estimate the cost of a suitable lot, erecting a building and furnishing same for the accommodation of such school, with the cost of conducting such school for the next twelve months; provided, that the county court, or the high school board, as herein constituted, may rent suitable rooms for the accommodation of the school. If rooms can be obtained in the public school buildings in the place in which the said school shall be located, they shall be given the preference; provided, further, that said board may contract with the board of directors of any district in the county that now maintains, or may hereafter maintain, a school of high school grade to teach all county high school pupils at such rate per capita or in the aggregate, as they may deem right and just, and shall pay for the same out of the high school fund."

For the past two years Toledo school district has maintained a district high school and it has proven a convenience to the scholars and patrons. In years past dozens of pupils from Lincoln county who desired higher studies than the public schools afforded were compelled to go outside the county for from one to two years to take up the studies supplied by the high school preparatory to entering college. With the county high school this expense and inconvenience to pupil and parents will be eliminated. The cost of maintaining a county high school would be very small compared with the advantages in saving of tuition, board, etc, in attending school outside the county, the increase in our population, and many other ways. Let us all pull for the County High School.

The decision of the Oregon Supreme court upholding the Tuttle

road law is a fortunate event in the history of road improvement in Oregon. While that law does not meet the requirements of conditions in all communities, it is an effective measure where circumstances make it applicable. The law provides for the permanent improvement of a highway at the expense of owners of property within two miles on either side of the road, the cost to be paid in installments. The principle is the same as that upon which most of the street improvement laws are based. The work cannot be done without the consent of the property-owners themselves, and, on the other hand, a minority cannot prevent the work.

Whether improvements shall be made under that statute is optional with those who are most directly interested. Its provisions are not obligatory upon any community. In some localities it is quite likely that this method of paying the cost of road improvement would be found unsatisfactory, but it is well to have the law upon the statute-books for the benefit of those who wish to operate under it. The law is fair and reasonable and was wisely upheld.—Oregonian.
