Section 1. That Ordinance No. 56. entitled an Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 37 entitled, in the matter of regulating the fees and salaries of the subordinate officers of the city of Toledo, be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. That the Marshal of the city of Toledo, Oregon, shall receive as Marshal, the sum of \$20 per month and shall receive fees only in case of making arrests or serving subpoenas on witnesses in cases before the City Recorder, which fees shall be the same as constable for Oregon, and shall be collected by the City Recorder as provided by Ordinance for collection of
