THE HOUSEHOLD

Devil's Food.

Boil together in a porcelain lined saucepan a half-cup each of grated chocolate, sweet milk and brown sugar. When as thick as cream, take from the fire and set aside to cool. Cream a half-cup of butter with one cup of brown sugar, add two well-beaten eggs and two-thirds of a cup of milk and vanilla flavoring. Into this mixture beat the boiled portion of the batter and add two cupfuls of flour sifted with a large teaspoonful of baking powder. Bake in layers and put together when cool, with boiled icing, covering the top of the cake with the same.

Potato Fritters.

One-half pound of cooked potatoes, one ounce of butter, pepper and salt, one yolk and two whites of egg. Rub potatoes through a wire sieve. Melt butter in a saucepan, and potato, yolk of egg, pepper and salt, and mix well. Beat the whites to a stiff froth and mix them lightly into the potato mixture. Drop the mixture in pieces about the size of a walnut into boiling fat and fry until nicely browned. Lift out with a perforated spoon, drain on paper and serve in a hot dish.

What They Will Make.

Left-over meats—salads and scallops.

Stale bread—bread crumbs for rolling.

Cheese—rarebits, crackers, macaroni.

Gravies, bones, etc.—a stock pot for soups.

Stewed tomatoes—scallops and soup flavorings.

Mashed potatoes—breakfast balls, luncheon puffs or souffles, purees, crust for meat pie.

Crumb Cake.

Cream a lump of butter the size of an egg with a cup of brown sugar and a teaspoonful of cinnamon and one cup of flour. Before going further, take from this mixture a large spoonful for frosting for the cake. Add to what remains a teaspoonful of cloves, a cup of sour milk, a teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a tablespoonful of hot water, a cup of seeded raisins, and, if needed, more flour. Put into a pan, sprinkle the top with the reserved frosting and bake.

Mock Venison.

Soak a leg of lamb in buttermilk or vinegar—preferably the former—and leave for two days. Wipe very dry and cut in the meat incisions about an inch in length, and put in each hole a half onion, add a little pepper and salt. Put the meat in the pan, pour a half-cup of boiling water over it, and roast until brown, then pour about the roast a half-pint of cream, and simmer for about ten minutes before serving.

Baked Liver.

Put two pounds of calf's liver in a pan and sprinkle with pepper and salt. Cut up two carrots and three medium-sized tomatoes and put with the liver, add a little spice, then make a dressing of stale bread crumbs seasoned with sage, put this in the pan with the liver, add a pint of water, cover the pan closely and bake for one and one-half hours without taking off the lid.

Tomatoes with Noodles.

Boil the noodles thirty minutes in salted water and drain. Have ready some cooked tomatoes passed through a sieve and seasoned to taste. Put the noodles in a baking pan and cover with tomato juice. Put dots of butter over the top and make thirty minutes in a quick oven.

Dish Drainer Toaster.

A dish drainer, which is a wire basket about fourteen by eight inches, with five short legs, makes a splendid toaster and holds eight slices of bread. If placed on top of the stove the bread will toast in three minutes, even when not previously dried in the oven.

Southern Sweet Potatoes.

Peel and slice two pounds of parabolled sweet potatoes and put in a buttered pudding dish. Pour over them a syrup made by boiling together two cups of water and one cup of brown sugar. Dot the potatoes with bits of butter and bake in a moderate oven.

Corn Meal Muffins.

One cup of flour, one cup of corn meal, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, water enough to make a thick batter (or sour milk is better); mix at night; in the morning add two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and one teaspoonful of soda. Bake in cake rounds.

Short Suggestions.

Never stir a cake after final beating. Beating motion should always be last used.

It is said that if a little borax is put in the water it will remove fruit stains from the hands.

A crust of bread put into the water in which greens are boiled will absorb all objectionable rankness of flavor.
