## Governor Chamberlain's Visit.

Last Friday Governor Chamberlain, as a member of the State Board of Fish Commissioners, made Toledo and Yaquina Bay a visit to investigate the growth and condition of the oyster industry on the Bay. The Governor was accompanied by Mrs. Chamberlain, Hon. Jefferson Myers of Lewis and Clark fame, Dr. Dav Rafferty a member of the Portland Park Commission, and George M. Trowbridge of the Oregon Journal. They were entertained while here by the Toledo Development League, members of which went to Elk City and boarded the train while other members with the band were at the train to meet him and his party when they arrived here. At the public reception, which was held in Woodman Hall, Friday evening, Mr. Chamberlain gave a very interesting talk on the development of Lincoln county and the resources of the state in general, after which Mr. Myers, Mr. Trowbridge and Dr. Rafferty each made a short talk.

Saturday in spite of the storm which prevailed, the party accompanied by a few members of the League went down to the oyster beds, on the launch Ella May, and here was where Jefferson Myers made a record as an oyster fiend, and demonstrated to his friends that he knew a few things about oysters, after a short stop they proceeded on to Newport, returning to Salem Monday.

## Judge H. M. Cake Here.

Judge H. M. Cake of Portland spoke at the Courthouse in this city last Monday evening. Mr. Cake is a candidate for the Republican nomination at the April primaries for the office of United States Senator. In his address he outlined his policies and promised, of course, to do all possible for the interests of the State if elected. He gave good reasons for being an advocate of Statement No. 1.
