Charles H. Gardner, Republican candidate for the nomination of Joint Representative for Lincoln and Polk counties, has been a resident of this county for nearly five years. Never in the history of the Pacific Northwest have the wheat exports held up as they have this season. All records for foreign shipments were broken in February, Portland leading all the wheat shipping ports of the entire United States with 2,279,792 bushels; Puget Sound was second with 2,056,332 bushels. March figures will not fall far behind those for February.

Call for Convention.

To the Socialists of Lincoln county, Or.: You are hereby notified that at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Socialist party held in Toledo on the 21st day of March 1908, it was ordered that the county convention of the Socialist party be called to meet at the Courthouse in Toledo on the 10th day of April, 1908, at 10 o'clock a. m. Said convention is called for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various county offices to be voted for at the General Election to be held the 1st day of June, 1908 and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The basis of representation shall be one delegate for each precinct and one additional delegate for each five votes or major fraction thereof cast for C. W. Barzee, Socialist candidate for Governor in 1908. It is further suggested that precinct conventions be held on Friday the 31 day of April, 1908, at one o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing delegates and nominating candidates for precinct officers. Precincts will be entitled to the following number of delegates: Alsea 1, Beaver Creek 3, Big Elk 1, Elk City 2, Five Rivers 1, Kernville 2, Little Elk 3, Morris 1, Nashville 1, Newport 2, Siletz 2, Toledo 6, Tidewater 2, Yreka 2.

the rights of any citizen. Our liberties should be maintained. The maintenance of our liberties does not include license to do wrong. The rights of every citizen may be secured legally without interference with the rights of one. Giving attention to these things will tend greatly to the purification of our political condition.

Council Proceedings.

The Common Council of the city of Toledo met in regular adjourned session March 18th. Present—Mayor R. A. Arnold; Councilmen E. J. Avery, C. B. Crosno, F. W. Carson, A. Rosebrook, A. T. Peterson, and Recorder Krogstad. Absent—Councilman G. R. Schenck.

Report read from Street Committee showing the sum of \$9 to be added to City lien docket against property of M. Wygant on Fourth street for putting down 40 feet of gutters, and \$9 added to the lien docket against property of St. Johns Episcopal church on Fourth street for putting down 40 feet of gutter. Report accepted and amounts added to former assessment on Lien Docket.

It being ascertained that lot 4, block 8 belong jointly to G. L. Gray and the Fir and Spruce Lumber Co. instead of all of it to Mr. Gray, it was therefore moved and carried that 12 front feet of said lot be assessed to Fir and Spruce Lumber Co. and the remainder, or 38 front feet to G. L. Gray, and the Lien Docket changed accordingly.

Report of Committee on Streets, on condition of city wharf, accepted and adopted.

Committee on Jail reported progress. On motion above committee given further time.

Following bills were allowed and warrants issued for the respective amounts:

McCaulou & Hoefflein, contract lowering City hall, etc., \$86.

M. N. Anderson, hauling dirt off planking, \$4.

Moved and carried that ordinance relating to obstructions placed on the City wharf, be enforced by the Marshal. On motion Street Committee was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for the repairing of City wharf and to advertise for bids for same, with or without material.

On motion the matter of removing piling in bottom of river causing obstruction to City wharf, be referred to Committee on Streets.

Moved and carried that Council extend the free use of City Hall and lights for use of Rosebrook's Brass Band for practice purposes.

No Sale for Bark.

The outlook for the cascara bark market is not good says the Oregonian. Trade has been nearly stagnant for several months, with prices tending downward, and the indications are that the situation will be even worse in future, owing to the failure of one of the largest handlers of this commodity in the world.

The Stallman & Fulton Company, a wholesale drug firm of New York, with branches in Chicago and London, assigned ten days ago, the failure was precipitated by the sudden death of Mr. Stallman immediately following the failure, cables announced that London brokers had offered 50 tons of bark on the London market at 30c. equivalent to 5 cents a pound here. This lot was believed to be a part of the holdings of the Stallman & Fulton Company and the fear was expressed that the receiver for the company might force on the American market the New York holdings of the firm, which are supposed to be large. Such action would absolutely swamp a market already demoralized.

Cascara bark was one of the first commodities to feel the effect of the trade depression in the East. The market, however, had not been active for several years, though a number of times speculators have thought the de-

mand was on the point of reviving. Statistics in this connection, however, proved misleading, for the manufacturers succeeded in getting along without what was thought to be their annual requirements. It may be they found a cheaper substitute, but it is more than likely that the trade has over estimated the demand.

Some 400 tons of bark of various ages are held by dealers and speculators and the supply bids fair to be further increased this year. Advice from different points in the cascara sagrada sections are that preparations are being made to peel a larger quantity than was brought out last year, owing to the fact that labor is more plentiful, but it will, without doubt, prove an unprofitable harvest for the peelers.

GRAZING PERMITS FOR 1908.

Applications for permits to graze live stock on the Uniqupa National Forest for the season of 1908 must be filed in the office of the undersigned at Eugene, Oregon, on or before March 15th, 1908.

The Secretary of Agriculture has authorized the grazing of 600 head of cattle and horses and 5000 head of sheep and goats, during the season of 1908.

The period during which grazing will be allowed and the fees to be charged are as follows: Grazing period, May 1 to October 31 1908, Cattle 25 cts per head, Horses 35 cts per head, Yearling, ending April 30, 1909, Cattle 40 cts per head, Horses 50 per head.
May 1 to Oct 31, 1908, Sheep 9 cts per head, Goats 10 cts per head; Yearling May 1, 1908 to April 30, 1909, Sheep 14 cts per head Goats 16 cts per head.

Blank forms to be used in making application and further information in regard to grazing will be furnished upon request.
