At the meeting of the Toledo Development League last Saturday evening it was decided to hold a county fair at Toledo during the coming fall. This is a good move and one that will undoubtedly meet with the approval of every citizen of the county. Let's all pull for the county fair.

C. C. Hammerly, of the McMinnville News Reporter, candidate for the nomination for Joint Senator, was in town Wednesday securing signatures to his petition. Mr. Hammerly is well known in Yamhill county, a man well qualified for the important office of Senator, and a newspaper man of ability. He says he is in the race to win, and among the newspaper push he is looked upon as an all-round whirlwind.—Hillsboro Independent.

Toledo will celebrate the Fourth of July this year. Preliminary steps were taken by the Toledo Development League at their last meeting. The appointment of committees was postponed until the next regular meeting of the League, when the committees for the various duties will be appointed and the work of organization gotten under headway. Everybody should get busy and make this celebration the best ever held in Toledo.

The Republican State Central Committee will meet in Portland, April 10, to call a state convention and to name the number of delegates that each county in the state may send to the convention. The State Convention will choose four delegates-at-large for the National Convention; also four candidates for presidential electors. The State Central Committee also will provide for conventions in the two Congressional Districts, each district naming two delegates, which gives Oregon, altogether, a total of eight delegates in the National Convention.

People from all parts of Oregon should make it a point while in Portland to visit the Forestry Building and familiarize themselves with the timber wealth of this state. That building is now in charge of Mr. M. W. Gorman as Superintendent, and he thoroughly knows the forests of the Northwest and the value of every tree. Mr. C. C. Michener, Field Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of America, recently visited the Forestry Building and remarked that it was the most satisfying and interesting building on this continent and that his hour with Mr. Gorman was the most instructive he had experienced in many years.

C. C. Hammerly, publisher of the News Reporter, McMinnville, is a candidate for Senator for this district, now represented by Dr. Wright, and composed of Lincoln, Tillamook, Yamhill and (recently added) Washington counties. Mr. Hammerly was born and raised on a farm in Iowa, taught school a number of years in country, high school and academy; but for the greater part of the time he has lived here in the west (over twelve years) has been an editor. He is a lifelong republican. If elected he will make a special effort to represent every portion of the district.

With this issue the LEADER starts out on a strictly cash basis. Every subscription on our lists is paid to within one year to this date, and a

great many one and some two years in advance. The new postal law compelled us to do this. We are more than pleased the way our subscribers responded to our call to pay up. We notified our delinquent subscribers of the new law some time ago and we are pleased to note that a very few have failed to come to the front, and the number we were compelled to cut off our list was very small. It proves to us that the LEADER is appreciated, and we shall in the future, as in the past, strive to make the LEADER a larger and better paper.

The Oregon Alaska Yukon Exposition Commission has let the contract for the Oregon building at Seattle, where the above exposition is to be held in 1909, for the sum of \$33,399. This commission is composed of W. H. Wehrung, of Hillsboro, W. T. Wright of Union, J. O. Booth, of Grants Pass, E. W. Rowe and M. D. Wisdom of Portland. Oregon was the first on the ground to commence the erection of a state building, and it is the intention of the Commission to make Oregon the first in everything throughout the Fair.

### The University Appropriation.

The last session of the Oregon legislature passed a bill appropriating \$125,000 for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon; to keep the buildings, grounds, and all other property thereof, in repair; for the purchase of additional lands for the campus thereof; for the construction of buildings and additions to the same; and for the purchase of library books, laboratory supplies and apparatus. A referendum was invoked on the bill, so it will not become a law until it is approved by a majority of the voters at the regular election on June 1st.

If the appropriation bill becomes a law, the amount of taxes required to support the University will amount to twenty-five cents on every \$1,000 worth of property and will grow less as the value of the property in the state increases. The man who pays taxes on \$500 worth of property will pay less than twelve cents for the support of the University, and on \$4,000 less than one dollar. Are such amounts excessive when it is proposed to build up an institution where the sons and daughters of our common people can receive the education that the times demand?

GRAZING PERMITS FOR 1908.  
Applications for permits to graze live stock on the Umpqua National Forest for the season of 1908 must be filed in the office of the undersigned at Eugene, Oregon, on or before March 15th, 1908.  
The Secretary of Agriculture has authorized the grazing of 600 head of cattle and horses and 5000 head of sheep and goats, during the season of 1908.  
The period during which grazing will be allowed and the fees to be charged are as follows: Grazing period, May 1 to October 31 1908, Cattle 25 cts per head, Horses 35 cts per head, Yearling, ending April 30, 1909, Cattle 40 cts per head, Horses 50 cts per head.  
May 1 to Oct 31, 1908, Sheep 9 cts per head, Goats 10 cts per head; Yearling May 1, 1908 to April 30, 1909, Sheep 14 cts per head Goats 16 cts per head.
