### Jones' Complaint Sustained.

The railroad commission in a decision which follows in part, censures the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad company for their passenger accommodations on the lines from Albany and Corvallis to Yaquina and Toledo:

"It is ordered that the railroad company, defendant shall in the future supply sufficient passenger cars so that all passengers leaving Corvallis or Albany westbound and Yaquina and Toledo eastbound may have a seat; and that the second class coach shall be supplied with ventilators."

The railroad company will have 20 days in which to make the necessary alterations. The case was brought on complaint of B. F. Jones of Independence, formerly of Toledo.—Capitol-Journal.
