### Council Proceedings.

Toledo, Or., April 9, 1908.

City Council met in adjourned session. Present—Mayor Arnold, Councilmen Avery, Crosno, Carson, Peterson and Schenck and Recorder Krogstad. Absent—Councilman A. Rosebrook.

Minutes of the last regular and adjourned sessions read and approved.

Street Committee reported having drawn up plans and specifications for the repairs ordered to City wharf, and bids advertised for.

The following claims allowed:

- Toledo Water Co., hydrant rent ..... 60.00
- J. R. Turnidge, hauling ..... 2.00
- Otto O. Krogstad, Recorder's salary and coal oil ..... 3.25
- M. N. Anderson, hauling ..... 5.00
- Gardner & Jorgenson, nails and hardware ..... 7.75
- David A. Ross, work on cross-walk ..... 4.50
- F. J. McElwain, Marshal's salary and labor ..... 33.38

On motion the expense of putting in crossing on south side of Fourth and Grove street be segregated by Street Committee, and assessed against the property affected by said improvement.

On motion bid of McCaulou & Hoefflein for repairing City wharf in the sum of \$80, it being the lowest bid, be accepted, they to furnish all hardware and material required.

On motion Marshal instructed to notify all parties having lumber, wood and other material on City wharf to have same removed forthwith in order to enable the contractors to perform the necessary repairs.

On motion Marshal instructed to replace cleats on gang plank to City float.

On motion matter of planking or corduroying balance of Hill and Seventh street to intersection of county road be referred to Street Committee.

Recorder exhibited receipt from City Treasurer in the sum of \$74.67 turned over, being amount received from fines and liens the past month.

Council here adjourned.

Died at Euclid, Oregon, on Friday, April 10, Mr. J. H. Smith.

Mr. Smith was born in Pennsylvania. He removed from Newberg Oregon to Euclid, three years ago. He leaves a young wife who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Weidman of Euclid, and four small children. His father and two brothers also survive him. Mr. Smith was improving a homestead and in sawing down a tree the tree fell sooner than was expected striking him and injuring him internally also breaking both of his legs below the knees. He died from his injuries thirty-six hours after the accident. In a railroad accident ten years ago he had both legs broken below the knees.
