Why do you not attend the meetings which are held for you and those in whose charge your children are placed? Will you please read the following, which is a copy of a paper read and discussed at the last of these meetings, held in Toledo, March 28. Are you not interested in this subject?

TEMPERANCE.

Temperance is one of the greatest problems, not only of our school, but of our state and nation, and is important to us as teachers, not only from the position we hold in regard to teaching the results, but because it is our duty to wield all influence possible at all times, in all places, against a power that can tear down in so short a time, all we have accomplished in many days, in our best efforts to make good citizens.

Intemperance means an over indulgence of any taste or desire, and while acknowledging the evil of any such indulgence, it is the liquor habit to which I here refer. But a practice of temperance in all things will tend to develop that power of resistance which may save many from a fatal fall.

But what some term a temperate use will not suffice with alcohol. Total abstinence is the only sure and safe rule. Its power is great and soon conquers, soon enslaves mind and body, home and family.

Over and over again the story has been told, of suffering, misery and want. We know it without repeating, and so does he who is just starting on his downward course.

Why does he not stop? Why? Who can answer this question? And who can tell us how we can stop him if he will not himself. This is the one question we must try to solve. Since the only sure way for the individual is total abstinence, is not the only sure way for us to accomplish good is to put it beyond his reach?

Again, how can we answer this? If it is the profit that is binding such a curse to our nation what can we do to take away that profit, only to use our untiring diligence and patience in exerting our influence over the masses that will not yet yield?

For every loyal citizen who loves home and country there is a large field over which his or her influence can be shed. And each one that we can win for the right side, takes one away from the wrong. And this victory will be won only by weakening the evil, while we strengthen the good.

How is this, are there more strictly temperate persons, in the last generation, than in the one preceeding it?

Are the young men and women rising to maturity, under an influence that will make them more temperate?

Is there amusement provided free from sin? Have a majority of the persons within reach of your influence and mine, done as much to provide for these things, as they have for the maintenance of the saloon? Have they even cast a ballot for measures, that will make homes pleasant, and the various places of amusement of such a nature, that young men may be proud to tike with them their sisters or mothers, and share with them their pleasures.

Many ballots have been cast for the saloons or for laws against it, and then for officers who will not or do not enforce these laws. If this charge seems harsh or severe, none need take offense who are not guilty. But something is wrong or we would not see such results as occurred at the Siletz recently.

We are glad to acknowledge that so many are doing good in various ways, as we note the great accomplishments, and consider the many liberties granted and one, not the least of these, is the privilege of local option, which is a great step in the advancement of temperance. While many who will always cling to their own arguments without proof, claim that conditions are no better; statistics from the different counties in our own state, where local option has been carried, show that there has been an improvement along all other lines of business. And in all cases saloon men work against this action. Is it because they are so anxious to pay the license?

But while we are glad for those, who are working in the right, we want more to work with them. It is not enough that a part are what they should be; this great enemy is so powerful, that in the hands of a comparatively small number, it can so soon sweep away all the very fondest hopes of our ambitious and the brightest prospects of those for whom we have toiled long and faithfully.

But all this cannot be accomplished at once. The manufacture of alcohol may never be abolished, as some argue for it so strongly for medical purposes. But it can in time be placed under restrictions that will protect those who are following the road to ruin by thousands and leading as many more after them, who are hardly responsible. Where will we place the responsibility
