Truant Officer.

Attention of the LEADER has been called to the fact that several children of school age in this district are not attending school.

Section 184 of the School Laws of Oregon says: "Every parent, guardian, or other person in the State of Oregon having control and charge of any child or children between and including the ages of nine and fourteen years of age, and every such child between fourteen and sixteen years of age not regularly and lawfully engaged in any useful employment, shall be required to send such child, or children, to the public schools for a term or period not less, nor more, than that of the number of months of public school held annually in the district in which such parent, guardian, or other person in parental relation may reside."

Section 185 says: "In case any parent or other person in parental relation shall fail to comply with the provisions of this act he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25, or by imprisonment in the county or city jail not less than two nor more than ten days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court."

In regard to truant officer Section 186 says: "It shall be the duty of the district boundary board (Commissioners' Court) of each county to appoint one or more persons to act as truant officers in districts of the second and third classes, said truant officers to be under the control and under the direction of the said district boundary board."

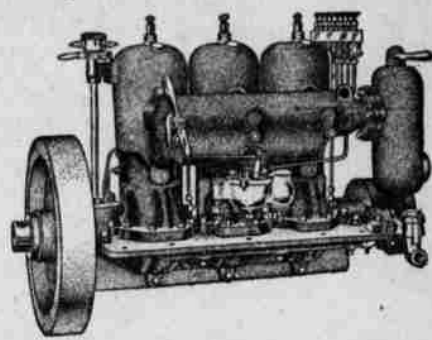
Section 188 says: "In case any parent or other person in parental relation shall fail to immediately send the child or children under his or her control, to the public school, as provided for in section 1 of this act, the truant officer, upon having notice from the proper authority of such fact, shall immediately and within twenty-four hours thereafter give formal written notice in person or by registered mail, to the parent or other person in parental relation, that the child, or children, shall present himself or themselves at the public school on the Monday following the date of such notice, with the necessary textbooks for instruction in the public schools of said district."

We have no truant officer in this district but if, as reported, children are allowed to remain away from school it is the duty of the Court to appoint such an officer.

A stranger in Toledo last week made the remark that he could not understand why Lincoln county did not produce more apples. He has been an apple grower all his life and knows the conditions that are required for the production of good fruit. He said Lincoln county has the best soil and climate for the production of apples of any section of the state. He predicts a great future for the apple industry in this county. We often wonder ourselves why our farmers do not devote more energy to the growing of orchards. Instead of shipping 15 to 20 carloads each year, as at present, we could just as well ship a thousand. There is no land in Lincoln county that would not grow apples—not an acre. What a different county this would be if one-tenth of the land now lying idle was producing

good, marketable apples. We have advantages that no other section of the state has. We do not have to irrigate; who have, as yet, no fruit pests; we have no land that will not produce; we have an ideal climate; we have railroad and water shipping facilities; we also have the box lumber and mills to manufacture fruit boxes. What more could we want? Every farmer in the county could plant an acre of orchard every year and in a very few years would be independently rich. Try it.

The grain crop of the Pacific Northwest has exceeded every estimate made by commercial organizations, railroads, newspapers and exporters.
